

Shipmates-Subgalleons,



The best thing that happened at the Salisbury meeting was that I was relieved of my SE Regional Director's position. This office now belongs to Ed Kracker of the Va. Tidewater Chapter. Ed has had this position before and is a very active SubVet. Regional meetings are primarily for the purpose of changing directors. The next best thing that happened was the opportunity to tell some of the young folks about SubVets. A request was made by one of the local middle schools for a veteran to give a short talk about what it was like during the war. Howie Rice "volunteered" to talk at the Charles C. Erwin Middle school about his service experiences of the war. There were about 100 students of the 5th and/or 6th grade level attended his talk Other details of the meeting are being reported elsewhere in this issue. Rose Mary and I were invited to attend the annual Memorial Service at the Norfolk Naval Station SubTraFac on May 28. The main speaker was the ex captain of the USS Grenadier (SS525), Theodore F. Davis, who is noted as having forced the surfacing of a Russian nuclear submarine, and by doing so won a "case of Jack Daniels Old No.7" Brand of Quality Tennessee Sour Mash Corn Whiskey". June Kracker and I presented the Memorial Wreath to the commanding officer and the COB of the next boat to leave Norfolk NOB, (I believe it was the USS Hamilton). More recently I had the opportunity to visit the WWII Memorial in Washington, DC. My son Clayton was visiting here at the beach and my other son Gene was on business in the DC area. Clayton drove me there, we spent a Thursday night in Arlington and met Gene the next day. The Metro system there is wonderful, we got on a train near the hotel and 10 minutes later got off at the Mall near the Washington Monument. A 10 minute walk and we were at this most awsomly beautiful Memorial structure. I couldn't even begin to describe it, but I'm sure most of you have seen it in pictures. If you have never been there take the time to do so and you will never regret it. While in the area we also visited the Vietnam Wall, the Lincoln Memorial and the Korea Memorial. By that time my "dogs" were barking and I had to get off my feet. Just a reminder-August is the beginning of a new year for the SubVets and dues are payable now. Also the next meeting will be at Rocky Mount, NC, on September 25. Make plans to get reacquainted with your shipmates at that time. See you there.

Last Sunday, July 11, a friend of mine at church handed me a book, "A Table in the Presence," by LT Carey H. Cash, a Navy Chaplain serving in Iraq with the U.S. Marines. "I know you weren't a Marine," said my friend, But please read this book. I promise, you won't regret it."

I took the book home, sat down, and started reading. No, I didn't read it through at one sitting. It wasn't that kind of reading: it wasn't an easy read. I had to stop periodically to renew my supply of tissues. Somehow, they accumulated moisture almost too rapidly for me to keep up with. I finally

reached the final summarizing sentence, Psalm 62:11-12: Once God has spoken; twice I have heard this: that power belongs to God; and loving kindness is thine, O Lord...."
But that's not all: knowing I had to return the book, I stopped by a bookstore the next day. They had one copy left. It's now in my library, in a place of honor along with all my submarine books.

I recommend it to you.

Minutes of USSVI District 3/Southeastern Region SUBVETS WWII Joint Meeting Salisbury, N.C. 14 May 2004

The meeting was called to order at 9:00 am by Vice Commander Dick Kanning, Tarheel Base, followed by the Pledge of Allegiance. Reverend Brawley gave the opening prayer.

Thirty-three WWII/USSVI members were present. The District 3 Commander, Ron Williams, and his wife, Peggy, an Associate member, were introduced.

Dick Kanning introduced Ms. Judy Newman, Salis bury Visitor's Center, who welcomed remarks and thanked the group for selecting Salisbury. Ms. Newman introduced Mrs. Susan Kluttz, Mayor of Salisbury, and commented that Mrs. Kluttz is the second female mayor to serve Salisbury. Mayor Kluttz welcomed all, told of the attractions in the area and invited the organizations to come back soon.

Ron Williams welcomed all to the third District Three meeting and thanked Commander Chuck Jensen, Dick Kanning, and the Tarheel Base for hosting this meeting.

District 3 New Business:

1. Establishing New Bases:

Presently only West Virginia and Alaska do not have bases. There are several MALs living in West Virginia. Chuck Jensen and Ron Williams will contact the MALs in an effort to establish a new base. A suggestion was made to set a time and place and then notify the MALs.

2. Increasing Membership:

- a. <u>Business Cards</u>. Print business cards with base information including POC for each member to hand out to prospective members.
- b. Show Your Colors. March in parades, wear Submarine hats and/or shirts, display decals on your vehicles etc. Tarheel base will be in the Memorial Day parade in Thomasville with their submarine on 31 May 2004.
- c. Establish a School Presentation
 Program. Northern Virginia base has
 presented their "History of the
 Submarine Service" program to 6th and
 7th graders this year. Several members
 mentioned their particular school
 programs. Howey Rice, Tarheel base,
 was presenting such a program at the
 time of the meeting. Ron Williams
 offered to provide copies of the
 Northern Virginia base presentation to all
 who request it.
- d. <u>Conduct Joint WWII and USSVI</u> <u>Meetings</u>. The floor was open to

discussion on this issue. All present agreed to a joint meeting in 2005. Ed Kracker, Southeaster Regional Director SUBVETS WWII, offered to host the 2005 meeting in Virginia Beach, VA. No date was set. Ed Kracker will chair this effort and Ron Williams will assist.

3. Proposed Amendments/Dues Increase:

- a. Dick Kanning brought up the problem of national rejecting proposed amendments which is in direct violation of USSVI By-Laws. Ron Williams carry this concern to the National convention and present it at the BOD meeting.
 b. Discussion concerning the dramatic increase in Nationals dues was held. All agreed that a dues increase is warranted but that the drastic increase may not be justified. Ron Williams suggested that those who are attending the National Convention bring their concerns up at the annual business meeting.
- 4. Chuck Jensen presented Ron Williams a Certificate of Appreciation from Pat Ulman, USSVI Eastern Regional Director.

The USSVI portion of meeting adjourned at 10:00 am.


BEVERLY JOHNSON RITES JULY 13

USS NORTH CAROLINA SSN-777 She's quiet, she's lethal and she's coming soon to an ocean near you.

Say hello to the USS North Carolina, a 377foot nuclear-powered attack submarine under construction at a Newport News, Va. shipyard. It is the first Navy vessel to carry the state's name since the battleship North Carolina, now a state historic site in Wilmington, was decommissioned in 1947. I got an advance peek at the new North Carolina last weekend when two master chief petty officers came to Salisbury to give a whiz-bang briefing to a reunion of World War II and Cold War submarine crews. Much of what I heard sounded like techobabble to a confirmed landlubber but I know this: submarine movies will never be the same. Forget "Run Silent, Run Deep." Forget "Hunt for Red October." Forget the crusty old captain turning his grease-stained hat around and ordering "Up periscope" while searching for the enemy. Instead, think of a \$2.2 billion video game with lots of things that go "boom!"

Master Chief Petty Officer Don Kultti, the top enlisted man in the Atlantic submarine force, outlined a typical mission for the new North Carolina:

Sent to investigate reports of weapons of mass destruction in a coastal country, the North Carolina slides through shallow water just off shore. It launches an unmanned underwater vessel that maps a safe route through a minefield. Then Navy SEALS go out through an airlock, retrieve their gear from outside storage lockers and climb into their 16-man mini-sub riding on the deck of the mother ship.

The mini-sub follows the safe route to the shore, the SEALS retrieve samples from the suspected weapons cache and return to the mother ship where the bad stuff is quickly analyzed in an on-board laboratory. The sub then lets loose with a barrage of Tomahawk cruise missiles which turn the target into dust. Then the good guys head for home at 25+ knots, sowing mines behind to deter pursuers. Torpedoes will take care of any enemy ships that don't take the hint. And if necessary, the North Carolina can dive below 800 feet to hide.

The traditional periscope of old movie fame

The traditional periscope of old movie fame is now a digital TV camera operated from a computer terminal. Those who control the

boat with touch-screen computers are called pilot and co-pilot. And best of all, every member of the crew has his own bunk, a rare luxury for American submarine crews. The USS North Carolina is scheduled to be finished in 2006 and put to sea in 2007. The new North Carolina is the fifth warship to carry the state's name. The first was a three-masted sailing ship that served from 1824 to 1866. From 1863 to 1864, the Confederate ironclad North Carolina patrolled the Cape Fear region. An armored cruiser named North Carolina served in World War I. The World War II battleship that is now a tourist destination received 12 battle stars for its service in that war. It also earned the nickname, "The Immortal Showboat" for the splendid way it looked when it sailed off to war. Last weekend, the old submariners slowly tolled a ship's bell for each American submarine lost at sea. It was a solemn and deeply-moving ceremony. May that bell never toll for the latest USS North Carolina.
