CHAPLAIN'S CORNER



THERE, BUT FOR THE GRACE OF GOD...!

Pete McFadyen, a quartermaster, and your Chaplain have something in common: we knew each other, we both served aboard the submarine BRILL, we both lived in Waterford, CT, and we both worked at Electric Boat. Pete McFadyen and North Carolina submarine veterans have something in common: we all have a tie with the submarine S-28, one of the 52 "lost boats." Pete was assigned to the S-28 on 3 July 1944, but remained ashore the following day to take a physical (S-28 went down, all hands lost, that following day). For us North Carolina submarine veterans, the S-28 is our assigned lost boat. Our charter? To perpetuate her memory and the memories of her crew. Pete set sail on his final eternal patrol on 13 March. His grandson, Jason Barnes of Shepherdstown, WV, read a touching, although not original, eulogy at Grandpa Pete's funeral mass. With a few, very slight changes, that eulogy, entitled, "Grandpa's Hands," could very well apply to any of us when we reach that point in our lives. It could apply, not only to us, but also to our Silent Partners. Though lengthy, we feel it worth repeating in its entirety.

GRANDPA'S HANDS

Grandpa, some 80 plus years, sat on the patio bench. He didn't move, just sat with his head down staring at his hands. When I sat down beside him, he didn't acknowledge my presence, and the longer I sat, the longer I wondered if he was OK. Finally, not really wanting to disturb him but, at the same time, wanting to check on him, I asked if he was OK. He raised his head, looked at me, and smiled. "Yes, I'm fine. Thank you for asking," he said in his clear strong voice.

"I didn't mean to disturb you, Grandpa, but you were just sitting here, staring at your hands, and I wanted to make

sure you were OK," I explained.

"Have you ever looked at your hands?" he asked. "I mean REALLY looked at your hands." I slowly opened my clenched hands and stared down at them. I turned them over, palms up. And then palms down. No, I guess I had never really looked at my hands, as I tried to figure out the point he was trying to make.

Grandpa smiled and continued.

Stop and think for a moment about your hands, how they have served you well throughout the years. My hands, though wrinkled, shriveled, and weak, have been the tools I have used all my life to reach out and grab and embrace life. They braced and caught my fall when, as a toddler, I crashed to the floor. They put food in my mouth and clothes on my back. As a child, my Mother taught me to fold them in prayer. They tied my shoes and pulled on my boots. They dried my children's tears and caressed the love of my life. They held my seabag and wiped my tears when I went off to war. They have been dirty, scraped, raw, swollen, and bent. They were awkward and clumsy when I tried to hold my newborn daughters.

Decorated with my wedding band, my left hand showed the world that I was married and loved someone special. They wrote letters home and trembled and shook when I buried my parents and walked my daughters down the aisle.

Yet, they were strong and sure when I pulled my buddy out of the water and lifted a rock off my best friend's foot.

They have held children, consoled neighbors, and shaken in fists of anger when I didn't understand. They have covered my face, combed my hair, and washed and cleansed my body. They have been sticky and wet, bent and broken, dried and raw. And to this day, when not much of any else of mine works real well, these hands continue to hold me up, lay me down, and fold in prayer. These hands are the mark of where I've been and the ruggedness of my life.

More importantly, it will be these hands that God will reach out and take when He leads me home. And by my hands, He will lift me to His side, and there I will use these hands to touch the face of Christ.

I will never look at my hands the same again. Now God has reached out and taken Grandpa's hands and led him home.

When my hands are hurt or sore, or when I stroke the face of my child or my wife, I will think of Grandpa. I know he has been stroked, caressed, and held in God's hands. I, too, want to touch the face of God and feel His hands upon my face.

Go ahead. Don't be ashamed. Look at your hands. There, but for the Grace of God...! Bless you,
