New Tarheel Base Commander Gordon Banks called the meeting to order at 12:59 PM with Chaplain Bill Whelan rendering the opening prayer. Gordon led the 38 Subvets present in reciting the Pledge of Allegiance.

All Subvets introduced themselves while stating the name/hull # of their qual boat, etc. Several first-time Subvet business meeting attendees were welcomed. It was noted that John Matthis was the oldest qualified Subvet present having completed his quals on board the USS Haddock (SS-231) in 1942

GOOD OF THE ORDER:

- Holland Club Coordinator Jim Davis honored 4 Subvets with induction into the Holland Club. New members to this prestigious group are Raymond Kilduff (USS Trigger (SS-564) - 1956); Donald Wells (USS Hardhead (SS-365) - 1960); Joe Sendek (USS Sennet (SS-408) - 1961); and Jerry Emerson (USS Jallao (SS-368) - 1961). Jim has two more inductions pending at this time.
- USSVI SE District 1 Commander Dick Kanning read a certificate of appreciation to be awarded to Pat Collins for a job well done as the Tarheel Base Holland Club Coordinator for 10+ years.



TOLLING OF THE BOATS:

1. Tarheel Base COB Jerry "Patch" Paciorek and Treasurer Spencer Combos held a reading and tolling of the bell for the ten WWII boats lost during the months of January and February.

REPORTS

- Base Commander Gordon Banks welcomed all to the first Tarheel Base business meeting of his tenure. He
 plans on setting a goal of limiting future meetings to no more than one hour in duration and end meetings
 with a presentation by a speaker. Due to the volume of items to cover this go around, that objective was
 not possible.
- 2. Base Vice-Commander Bill (Butterbean) Dixon covered a suggestion that Subvets mingle with wives, couples, and new attendees during the breakfast get-togethers, i.e. don't be seated as separate groups.
- Motion was made, seconded, and passed to approve the minutes from the last Tarheel Base business
 meeting held on 16 October 2010. Minutes are recorded by Base Secretary Bill Lowe and published in the
 All Clear plus posted on the NC Subvets website.
- 4. Tarheel Base Treasurer Spencer Combos reported the current Base checking account balance at \$4,650.76 as of 02/05/2011. Tarheel Base has a total of 177 members of which 133 are life members and are not required to pay National dues. Spencer stated 1 annual and 3 life members have not paid their Base dues. Also the Base has 57 WWII Subvets and 81 Holland Club members.

- 5. All Clear editor Patch Paciorek thanked Subvets for submitting info/articles for the upcoming issue of the All Clear and a cutoff date for any additions is Friday, 11 February 2011. Patch is now on the judging committee for the National Newsletter of the Year Award.
- 6. Jerry Leppart- NC Subvets License Plate "Czar" said the bill, S-24, has been filed again and is the only license plate bill pending in the NC Legislature at present. Bill S-24 has had one reading in the Senate and now resides in the Senate Finance Committee. Jerry covered a list of State Senators and urged Subvets to send their respective Senators a cordial note requesting support for the bill. Also, Jerry stated he has 292 names for 420 plates on his list to date. A picture of the recently approved Tennessee Subvets plate was passed around with "most" all present agreeing that it looks very nice but too "busy".
- 7. Tarheel Base Storekeeper and Public Relations Officer Jim Wallace listed some items he has for sale: USSVI calendars for \$10.00 and nice coffee mugs at a reduced price of \$5.00 each. Also, anyone that ordered qual date pins need to pick same up from Jim. A UNC- TV Fund Drive was covered. If the Base can recruit at least 20 volunteers (wives and kids included) to answer telephones during a particular time slot, two 30 second on-air spots will be available to publicize USSVI. All agreed for Jim to plan for this event with a possible date of 27 March and an AM time slot.
- 8. Commander Gordon asked for a volunteer to be in charge of setting up a POW/MIA table. Scott Powell said he would take on the task since his father was a POW.
- 9. A request was made by Commander Gordon for a volunteer to step forward and take possession of the submarines, candles, and etc. used for the lost boats ceremony during the annual Pearl Harbor meeting. Wayne Powell never learned an important lesson during his active duty days - never volunteer-!! Wayne is now "the keeper of the boats."

UNFINISHED BUSINESS ITEMS AND REPORTS:

- 1. Burnsville quarterly meeting will be held on 20-22 May 2011 at the same location as last year the Pinebridge Inn in Spruce Pine. Late word from Steve Bell, Carolina Piedmont Base Commander, is that this hotel has been sold and the location for the meeting may change. More info will be on the website soon.
- 2. Parades List of upcoming parades: 12 March St. Patrick's Day in Raleigh; 19 March St. Patrick's Day in Charlotte; 9 April Azalea Festival in Wilmington (Coastal Carolina Base to handle details); and 30 May Memorial Day Parade in Thomasville. Patch will set up an area on the NC Subvets website for parade info.
- 3. SE District 1 Commander Dick Kanning covered plans in the works for the 2012 USSVI National Convention to be held in Norfolk, VA. There will be a Casino Night on Wednesday and a Tolling of the Boats Ceremony on the fantail of the Battleship Wisconsin. There will be a need for volunteers (2 man teams) from SE VA and NC Bases to man the registration table Tuesday through Friday and 2 hours on Saturday.
- 4. Chuck Jensen reported \$3,700 (donated by the WWII Subvets and Subgalleons groups) will be used to finance the placement of 1 or 2 benches at the S-28 Memorial in the BB-55 Park in Wilmington. Hopefully, this project will be completed before the quarterly meeting scheduled for April 9, 2011 in Wilmington.
- 5. Dick Kanning announced a revision of USSVI Bylaws will now allow him to run for SE District Commander-if nominated. Also, Dick is serving on a committee that is looking into sizing USSVI districts more equitably.

 Bylaws will need to be amended.)
- Motion 3 To schedule Base meetings' usual start at 10:00 AM. The Base Commander has discretion to start at some other time.
- Motion 4 To direct treasurer to write a check for \$100.00 to the Floats Maintenance Fund, c/o Chuck Jensen.
- Motion 5 To direct treasurer to write a check to Ron Athey, Convention Comm. Chair, for \$50.00 toward costs of 2011 National Convention.
- Motion 6 To direct treasurer to write a check to Dick Kanning for \$100.00 as contribution recognizing CSL Sailor of the Year Runners-Up.
- Motion 7 To amend Base Bylaws, Art. II, Sec. 1 to read "Annual Base dues will be \$15.00, effective January 1, 2012." Members as of February 5, 2011 who have paid dues for future years will have such dues payments honored at the original amount.

Meeting was adjourned at 1502.


Gene Rutter was the winner of the 50/50 raffle drawing in the amount of \$80.00.

CHAPLAIN'S CORNER



Chaplain Bill Whelan WWII Tarheel Chapter USSVI Tarheel Base

WE'RE ALL TALENTED

It's always difficult for me to decide what to include in this "Corner." So yesterday, I went where I usually go when I'm in a quandary--to the Good Book. Specifically, I went to one of my favorite verses of Scripture, Habakkuk 2:1a, "I will stand at my watch and set me upon the tower and will watch to see what He will say unto me." Wow! What advice for a submariner who has spent many hours as a watchstander and the tower obviously refers to the conning tower of a submarine. The best I could do was go upstairs and do what I do every night before hitting the sack: I read the meditation for the day. Although it was written by Cinda King, a freelance writer from Prospect, KY, I had no doubt, they were His words, telling me that each submariner is talented--the talents differ and sometimes go unrecognized, but the fact remains--we're all talented. Read on and see if you don't agree with her. I've made very few changes to the text.

"Frequently, I look at my daughter and ask, 'How did you get to be so smart?' I will be fuming over a situation where a resolution seems elusive, and she will offer an insight or suggestion that will suddenly make things fall into place. As a musician, she is able to engage a different part of her brain; she hears angles, shadows, and dimensions that are all but invisible to me. When I think of my daughter's talents, I feel a deep sense of awe.

"A similar sense of wonder comes over me when I watch my son size up scientific or mathematical problems. Problems that leave me shaking my head, he works through with ease and speed. When I watch him at work on such problems, there is no doubt that he is truly talented.

"I could list the abilities of countless others who have talents I appreciate and sometimes envy, but I've found that my time is better spent considering my own talents and how I can best use them. The activities I enjoy most flow from my few talents. I'm happiest and most fulfilled when I use those talents in service to others.

"Each of us has talents and abilities, natural inclinations to understand or see the world around us in creative and unique ways, to process scientific ideas, or to perform certain tasks. The possibilities are endless. Our challenge is to uncover and understand these talents, to accept them, and use them to serve others."

The bottom line: if you haven't already discovered your talents and figured out how to use them to help the North Carolina Submarine Veterans better serve our shipmates, look closer and, yes, VOLUNTEER.

Hello Subvets! Latest on the Subvet Specialty Plate ... last note mentioned we'd need a new Bill in the 2011 Legislative Session which began Jan. 26, 2011. Since the last update, I've picked up some more Subvets wanting the plate ... I now have 298 Names wanting 425 Plates ... and it's PLATES that count.

I met with Senator Neal Hunt on Monday, January 31, 2011 ... figured I've give the legislators a couple days to get through their handshakin' & back-slappin'. He already had the draft of the bill, which is the same as we submitted 2 years ago (remember, 3 of us asked for this bill exactly 2 years ago on February 3, 2009). Our bill was filed on 2-1-11 and read into the Senate on 2-2-11. It's Senate Bill S24. It's the first Specialty Plate Bill filed for this new Session. Hopefully, it will move along early in the legislative process. We now await action by the Senate Finance Committee. If any or your Senators or Reps are on the Senate Finance Committee, you might want to call them or drop them a line. I have a list of Senate Finance Committee Members if you want to know who's who.



Chaplain Bill

(Greenbackville, VA) Donald LeDuc, 86, sailed on his Eternal Patrol, from his home in Greenbackville, VA, on 21 September 2010. He was a faithful member of both U.S. Submarine Veterans of World War II (card No. 08643) and U.S. Submarine Veterans Inc. (card No. 2323). After 3-1/2 months in a nursing home, coping with several strokes, he returned home where he was surrounded by his loving family before his peaceful passing.

Don was a radioman aboard two submarines during World War II: USS BREAM (SS-243) and USS BASHAW (SS-241). He qualified aboard BREAM in 1944.

VA TINNITUS CARE UPDATE

VA Tinnitus Care Update 02 (RAO Bulletin - 1 February 2011): Scientists from the University of Texas announced in the scientific journal Nature that they have found a way to treat chronic tinnitus. Tinnitus, a chronic ringing in the ears is the most common service connected disability for enlisted Air Force retirees and veterans returning from the wars in Iraq and Afghanistan. The VA pays approximately one billion dollars (\$1 billion) a year for service connected disability payments for tinnitus. Doctors believe that over 23 million Americans suffer from some degree of this condition including 10% of seniors and a whopping 40% of veterans. The scientists believe that it is caused by the brain failing to adjust to nerve damage caused to exposure to loud or continual noise. Michael Kilgard, the co-author of the study said: "Brain changes in response to nerve damage or cochlear trauma cause irregular neural activity believed to be responsible for many types of chronic pain and tinnitus. We believe the part of the brain that processes sounds - the auditory cortex-delegates too many neurons to some frequencies and things begin to go awry." The treatment (so far successful in rats) electronically stimulates the Vagus nerve (which runs from the brain to the abdomen) while playing a high pitched tone. Human clinical trials are expected to start in the next several months. This technique called VNS is already used to treat approximately 50,000 people with epilepsy or depression. If the trials are successful this would be the first treatment that would eliminate rather than just mask tinnitus. [Source: TREA Washington Update 14 Jan 2011 ++]

NAVY COMMEMORATES 50TH ANNIVERSARY OF 1ST SSBN PATROL

When the ballistic missile submarine USS George Washington (SSBN 598) departed Charleston, SC, 50 years ago, it marked the beginning of a new era in strategic deterrence.

On Nov. 15, 1960, the "Georgefish" – a converted attack submarine – began the U.S. Navy's first SSBN deterrent patrol. With her stealth capability and the 16 Polaris missiles she carried, the George Washington provided the United States with a forward presence unprecedented in naval history.

As the Navy celebrates the golden anniversary of the George Washington's historic deployment, the ballistic missile submarine remains a key component of our nation's strategic deterrent. Today, the Navy employs 14 Ohio-class Trident SSBNs in its deterrent force – eight at Naval Base Kitsap-Bangor, Wash., and six at Naval Submarine Base Kings Bay, Ga.

"USS George Washington revolutionized the way we conduct both submarine warfare and strategic deterrence," said Rear Adm. Bob Hennegan, Commander, Submarine Group 9. "The legacy of that first patrol is the strong, capable deterrent force you see in today's Navy."

Commissioned on Dec. 30, 1959, the George Washington was originally laid down in 1957 as the Skipjack-class attack submarine Scorpion (SSN 589). However, the decision was made to add a 130-foot section behind the sail that would carry 16 Polaris A1 missiles, resulting in the world's first ballistic missile submarine.

Following her commissioning, George Washington would successfully carry out the first submerged Polaris launch on July 20, 1960 at the Atlantic Missile Test Range, launching two missiles. Later that year, she left her homeport of Groton, Conn., for Charleston to load her full complement of Polaris missiles.

Cmdr. James Osborn Jr. and his Blue Crew took George Washington out of Charleston on Nov. 15 to begin her historic first patrol, which concluded Jan. 21, 1961 at New London, Conn., after 66 days submerged. George Washington's Gold Crew followed with its first patrol from February-April 1961.

George Washington was the first of the "41 For Freedom" – the Navy's first 41 ballistic missile submarines. Together, they paved the way for future Polaris, Poseidon and Trident submarines that continue to maintain the nation's strategic deterrent today.


