





Tarheel Base Commander Gordon Banks called the meeting to order at 1002 with Chaplain Bill Whelan offering the opening prayer. Gordon led the 34 Subvets and 6 guests present in reciting the Pledge of Allegiance.

#### **TOLLING OF THE BOATS:**

COB Patch Paciorek and Treasurer Spencer Combos conducted a reading of the names and tolling of the bell in remembrance of the 13 US Navy submarines lost during the months of March and April.

#### **INTRODUCTIONS:**

All Subvets and guests introduced themselves with Subvets stating the name of their qualification boat. A hearty welcome was extended to the lady guests and to a first time Subvet attendee LCDR Dan Eddinger II. Dan retired from submarine service on 1 January 2011 and is joining the Tarheel Base today. A thank you was rendered to Paul Hiser for "steering" this Subvet our way. Julie Daw, a home schooling mom from Apex, was among the guests present. The scuttlebutt was that she came on a fact-finding mission to see what this group of Subvets was all about after her husband made contact with Vice Commander Butterbean during last month's St. Patrick's Day parade in Raleigh.

#### **GOOD OF THE ORDER:**

Holland Club Coordinator Jim Davis honored two Subvets with induction into the Holland Club. New members of this prestigious group are Allen Ashdown and John Crosson. Allen's wife and four members of John's family were present for the ceremony. Allen and his bride reside in Pinehurst, NC.



#### **REPORTS**

- 1. Base Commander Gordon Banks reported on Tarheel Base participation in events during the past few weeks such as the UNC-TV Telephone Fund Raiser. Gordon commended the continued outstanding job performed by the slate of Base officers he inherited upon his appointment as Base Commander.
- 2. Base Vice Commander Bill (Butterbean) Dixon presented Henry Hagwood with the first Vice Commander's Award (shoulder patch) for his great job of handling various raffles and supplying refreshments during Base meetings. Butterbean suggested calls be made to Subvets that aren't present for Base meetings and other events. Also he made his usual appeal for recruitment of new members and emphasized the importance of obtaining the name and e-mail address of potential new members. Butterbean called for all to pay Base and/or National dues in a timely manner.

- 4. Tarheel Base Treasurer and Record Keeper, Spencer Combos reported a Base checking account balance of \$4,400 at the end of the first quarter and a current balance of \$4,110. Tarheel Base membership stands at 172 with 2 listed as associate members. This total includes Dan Eddinger who joined today.

- 5. All Clear editor Patch Paciorek stated he had received a \$20 donation to the newsletter from Charles Stevenson. This money will be applied to the cost of mailing out 71 condensed copies (bulletins) of the All Clear. SE District 1 Commander Dick Kanning congratulated Patch on his appointment to the judging committee for the National Newsletter of the Year Award.
- 6. NC Subvets License Plate "Czar" Jerry Leppart covered the latest news on the "stagnation" in the North Carolina Legislature of the bill for the Subvet plate. The bill, S24, is still in the Senate Finance Committee's hands. Jerry plans on spending a considerable amount of his time down at the Legislature pushing this bill along as soon as he retires from his "second job". To date, he has a total of 300 names and 427 applications for the plate. Also, Jerry stated the bill that authorizes the DMV to include a veteran's branch of service on their driver's license is close to passing.
- 7. Tarheel Base Storekeeper and Public Relations Officer Jim Wallace thanked the 23 Subvets and family members for volunteering to help with the UNC-TV Fund Drive held on 26 March. All who participated had an enjoyable time and a "repeat performance" will be planned before year's end. Also, Jim stated he has a list of requested "ship's store" items that are not in stock. He hopes to get these items in soon. Some qual date pins were passed out during the meeting.

#### **UNFINISHED BUSINESS ITEMS:**

- 1. Parades 09 April 2011 Azalea Festival in Wilmington Info on this parade scheduled for next Saturday has been posted on the website and sent out via e-mails. Other upcoming parades are:
  - Monday, 30 May Memorial Day- Thomasville- "Uncle Sam" will be riding on the sub.
  - Saturday, 02 July Iredell County (Troutman)
  - Monday, 04 July Faith 4<sup>th</sup> of July
- 2. 2011 NC Subvets Burnsville Memorial meeting is scheduled for 20-21 May 2011. A pre-registration form has been published in the 1<sup>st</sup> Quarter copy of the All Clear. In order to obtain the special room rate, reservations must be made by 02 May 2011 at the host motel the Skyline Village Inn in Spruce Pine, NC.
- 3. Commander Gordon stated the two Subvets, Dave Campbell and Wayne Powell, who volunteered to head up the service projects committee, were not present. Gordon, along with Jerry Emerson and John Rupertus, covered a list of 9 possible projects for Base participation. The general consensus was in favor of a "hands on" project such as the Adopt a Highway Program. It would involve cleaning up litter on the sides of a section of highway four times a year and will afford public exposure of the NC Subvets name on road signs. Information on this project will be forthcoming. Also, it seems clear, participation in the UNC-TV Fund Raiser will continue as a Base project.



#### WHAT'S SO UNUSUAL ABOUT THREES?

There's nothing really unusual about threes.

There were three of us kids in our family: my twin sisters Mollie and Betty and me. Tuesday night (17 May), my wife Anne and I returned home following our usual monthly birthday supper with 20 or more of our Church friends. We returned find a phone message that what had been three were now two: Sister Betty had just passed away in New Hampshire after a three-year battle.

The following day (Wednesday, 18 May), a group of us Subvets gathered in Greensboro to bid farewell to Pat Galaviz, Shipmate Ed's lovely wife. Threes appeared again: this time in the hull numbers for Ed's two boats-SS-393 (QUEENFISH) and SS-322 (BLACKFIN). Those two hull numbers musically provide significant food for thought and inspiration: verse 5 of hymn 393 tells us that "There's a Spirit in the air, calling people everywhere;" and verse 4 of hymn 322 reminds us that "A dear one in heaven thy heart yearns to see."

The next day (Thursday, 19 May), members of the Tarheel and Nathanael Greene Bases gathered in Clemmons to help tend lines as GATO Bill Bradburn sailed on his eternal patrol. Bill's widow Jocelyn's kind words following the celebration of Bill's life indicated that she was particularly pleased with the appropriateness of the related music. Tarheel Base associate member Barbara Dixon set the tone of the service with another "three": for the prelude she sang "A Still Small Voice," a cappella, telling of the Prophet Elijah's encounter with the Lord in 1 Kings: 19:13; and her postlude consisted of two hymns "Amazing Grace" and "Turn Your Eyes Upon Jesus." Using the hull number of GATO as a guide, hymn 212 appropriately reflected the mood of the day, "I love you Lord and I lift my voice to worship you."

Significant enough to merit a separate paragraph in this Corner was an event prior to the GATO Bill service. We noticed WWII Subvet Joe Clark down front, standing in front of GATO Bill's Subvet vest, his head bent, and his lips moving. When he returned to the rear of the church, we asked Joe what he was saying to Bill. He replied quietly, "I was singing "Sink 'em all," to Bill -- we sang that song together some time ago." We understood.

Closing out our thoughts on threes was the third consecutive memorial service on Friday (20 May) at graveside in Spring Hope. Three Tarheel Base Subvets tended lines as submariner Westray (Zeke) Bunn sailed on his eternal patrol. In keeping with relating hull numbers with hymns, the hull number (SS-214) of Zeke's boat GROUPER points to the hymn, "Sing Hallelujah to the Lord."

That word Hallelujah is an appropriate closure for this Corner on threes since it is used to express praise, joy, or thanks.

Oh, yes, there is another significant three: God the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit.

Our thanks to all who paid their respects to Pat, GATO Bill, and Zeke.

Their oars are at rest.

#### REMEMBER THE S-28 LOST ON JULY 4, 1944

The U.S. Submarine Veterans of WWII assigned USS S-28 (SS-133) to the State of North Carolina.

The S-28 was last with 50 crew members while conducting training exercises off Hawaii with the US Coast Guard Cutter Reliance. After S-28 dove for a practice torpedo approach, Reliance lost contact. No distress signal or explosion was heard. Two days later, an oil slick was found near where the S-28 was lost. The exact cause of her loss remains a mystery. 
Shipmates, I am in the process of a major addition to the online Decklog sub crew records. Many crew records have been added and others already in place have been added to (2,000+ records to date).


#### Thomasville Memorial Day Parade and Static Display

#### **VET CEMETERY NORTH CAROLINA**

Sometime this spring (2011), a new state highway historical marker (monument) will be planted near the entrance to the North Carolina Wilmington National Cemetery. The metal plaque will be the result of a campaign by a local Civil War reenactor Fred Johnson who serves in a U.S. Colored Troops unit. Thousands of Union dead from Fort Fisher and the Wilmington campaign were reburied there when the cemetery opened in 1867. Some 3,300 African-American soldiers in two brigades served in this area. During the assault on Fort Fisher, they held a line at Kure Beach to prevent Confederate forces from relieving the fort. Later, they formed the vanguard on the east bank of the Cape Fear River as Gen. Alfred Terry's Union forces advanced on Wilmington. Many of these Colored Troops were North Carolinians and ex-slaves. The troops served as occupation forces in this area after the war, and many of the soldiers stayed on after their discharges. Many of these resident veterans were buried at the National Cemetery, well into the 1900s. Records identified 92 U.S. Colored Troops buried at Wilmington National Cemetery. However, further research indicated that many more bodies were moved to the cemetery between 1867 and 1882 – perhaps as many as 500 in all. An order for the new marker will be formally placed later this month and delivery is expected two months after that. The finished marker will be placed somewhere along Market Street near the National Cemetery gate.

The state's historic highway marker program celebrates its 75<sup>th</sup> anniversary this year. A total of 1,548 markers line North Carolina's streets and roads. #### **MEN WHO WALK APART**

Taken from the Submarine Veterans of WW II "Blow & Vent" Newsletter by Bob Dixon

In the days when, with other war correspondents, I loitered about Honolulu, waiting with polite skepticism for the Pacific Fleet to work its miracle, submarines held Interest only as mysterious gadgets that had no real part in the war we lived with. We would see them slide into harbor occasionally, salt-caked, battered and ugly looking long black sewer pipes covered with patches of white. We were struck by the pomp and circumstance of their arrival with a busy looking four-piper ahead and sometimes another behind them. We had heard the legend of how one of them had to work for two days to get the channel patrol to quit dropping depth charges on it, so we weren't surprised at the escort.

For a long time submarine men were as rare in our jittery little community as visitors from Mars. After a while, we came to see more of them and marked them instantly as creatures apart. They were for the most part pale and nearly always thin young men who walked quietly aloof with others of their kind. High-hat, some of the gobs from the surface ships called them, but they said it without resentment or unkindness. If these lads considered themselves a special breed of Navy men, well so did everybody else. The boot looked at them with obvious awe, the older men with grave respect. For whatever the current status of the submarines as warships, nothing had lessened their hold on the imagination of men in the less secret services. It was tradition in the Navy that only the most Intelligent applicants were ever selected for the submarines, that only the men without fear volunteered for the duty and only the strong survived.

For my part, I was struck with the extreme youth of submariners. The skippers were all lieutenant commanders, few of whom seemed to be more than thirty years old. The crewmen, you felt, might average nineteen or twenty. The CPO's of the service, the graybeards and high priests of this highly exclusive sect, were usually twenty-five or twenty-six.

One thing about them, strikingly obvious to those who lived next door to them in close confines of wartime Honolulu was their resilience. Uniformly when they came off patrol they were pallid strained-looking and tired. All of them were thin, some positively emaciated, as you might expect in men who had just passed a couple of months locked away from sunlight inside an iron barrel. They were alert and pleasant and interested in their surroundings, but so far as my own observations went, few of them in their first two or three days ashore ever laughed out loud. If any of them went out and got drunk, which certainly seemed a good and excusable idea, they did it like everything else they did, in their own way and at their own convenience.

Even after the provost's anti-liquor order had been repealed, you never saw one of them in any of the local dives. I, for one, was too old a hand to figure that this indicated they had been recruited in Sunday Schools of the stricter order, but It seem to hint at least they were fastidious.

They would come ashore and for two or three days disappear from sight, which I suppose was not remarkable in-as-much as in those days they quartered on the base. But In a matter of some seventy-two hours, they'd be in circulation again and we'd stand and look at them as they passed wondering at their metamorphosis. By some miracle of the Hawaiian sun, or more likely of their tough youthfulness, they would have lost their corpse like whiteness and with it their grave reserve. You knew, while doubting the evidence of your own eyes, that they were ready for sea duty and in another day or two they'd be gone again - once more on their way to Japan or the mid-Pacific Islands or the chilly deadliness of the Aleutians.

None of them talked to us, and since we shared some of the fleet's awe of them, we made no effort to break down their reserve. They were kids, of course, like the average run of American kids, and there was no shyness about them. But they weren't supposed to talk about themselves or their work and they didn't. Whether or not we felt that they might have anything important to say if they had chosen to talk, we somehow respected the delicacy of their position chiefly, because we instinctively respected the men themselves.

One surprising thing about them -- and even now after I have lived with them and eaten in their messes and shared to some small extent their lives aboard the submarines, I still wonder at it--was their mutual tolerance. It had long been my conviction that two of the best friends on earth weather-bound in a lonely cabin, or marooned on a sand bar somewhere, would most likely be at each other's throats in a week. Yet, here were men who lived virtually in each other's laps for months on end saecula saeculorum, and ashore where they had every opportunity to separate and enjoy a few hours of privacy, were seldom out of one another's company. When you saw one of them you seldom saw less than half a dozen. And while they would fight willingly -- individually or collectively -- with members of the lesser service, they seldom so much as raised their voices to any of their own kind.

I heard a correspondent mention to a submarine skipper one time that they were more like a family than a ship's crew and the captain snorted, "A family" he said. "Listen, we couldn't live in one of these pipes if we acted like a family. Brother we're all in here together and we have to get along!" We didn't know much about the submarines in those days but we were certainly learning something about the men who sailed in them and we were beginning, in a vague way, to understand why they thought themselves different. The main reason seemed to be they were different.

The experience was a good one.


