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LOST SUBMARINES - FOURTH QUARTER

OCTOBER

USS Seawolf (SS-197)

Lost on October 3, 1944 with the loss of 102 officers and men on her 15th war patrol when she was sunk just north of Moritai by USS Rowell, a Destroyer Escort (DE). In this tragic error, Rowell mistook Seawolf for a Japanese submarine that had just sunk another Destroyer. Seawolf ranks 7th for enemy ships sunk.



USS S-44 (SS-155)

Lost on October 7, 1943 with the loss of 56 men when it was sunk off Paramushiru, Kuriles. S-44 was on her 5th war patrol after attacking a target thought to be a merchant on the surface, S-44 found herself in a losing gun battle with a heavily armed Japanese destroyer. Two men were taken prisoner and survived the war.



USS Wahoo (SS-238)

Lost on October 11, 1943 with the loss of 79 men near La Perouse Strait. Under command of one of the great sub skippers of World War II, LCDR "Mush" Morton, Wahoo was on her 7th war patrol. Wahoo had won a Presidential Unit Citation and ranks 5th in the number of enemy ships sunk. She was lost to depth charges dropped by a Japanese patrol aircraft.



USS Dorado (SS-248)

Lost on October 12, 1943 with the loss of 78 when she was sunk in the western Atlantic near Cuba. Newly commissioned, she had departed New London and was en route to Panama. She may have been sunk by a U.S. patrol plane that received faulty instructions regarding bombing restriction areas or a German U-boat that was in the vicinity.



USS Escolar (SS-294)

Lost on October 17, 1944 with the loss of 82 men. She was on her 1st war patrol and was most likely lost to a mine somewhere in the Yellow Sea.



USS Shark II (SS-314)

Lost on October 24, 1944 with the loss of 90 when she was sunk near Hainan. The second boat to carry this name during World War II, she was on her 3rd war patrol. Shark was sunk by escorts after attacking and sinking a lone freighter. Compounding the tragedy, it turned out that the freighter had 1800 U.S. POWs on board.



USS Darter (SS-227)

Lost on October 24, 1944 when she became grounded on Bombay Shoal off Palawan and was then destroyed to prevent her falling into enemy hands intact. The entire crew was rescued by USS Dace. Winner of one Navy Unit Commendation, Darter had sunk a heavy cruiser and damaged another and went aground while attempting an "end around" on an enemy formation in hopes of getting in an attack on a battleship.



<u>USS Tang (SS-306)</u>

Lost on October 25, 1944 with the loss of 80 men in the Formosa Strait while on her 5th war patrol. Tang ranks 2nd in the number of ships sunk and 4th in tonnage, and had won two Presidential Unit Citations. During a daring night surface attack, Tang was lost to a circular run by one of her own torpedoes. Nine of the crew were taken prisoner, including CDR. O'Kane and five who had gained the surface from her final resting place 180 feet below. All survived the war, and CDR O'Kane was awarded the Congressional Medal of Honor.



USS 0-5 (SS-66)

Lost on October 29, 1923 with the loss of 3 men when rammed and sunk by SS Ababgarez off the Panama Canal.



LOST SUBMARINES - FOURTH QUARTER (cont.)

NOVEMBER

USS Albacore (SS-218)

Lost on November 7, 1944 with the loss of 86 men when she was sunk off northern Hokkaido. Winner of two Presidential Unit Citations, Albacore was on her 11th war patrol and struck a mine while running submerged near a Japanese patrol craft that had detected her.



USS Growler (SS-215)

Lost on November 8, 1944 with the loss of 84 men when she was sunk in the South China Sea. Winner of two Navy Unit Commendations, Growler was on her 11th war patrol, and was lost while attacking a convoy, probably as a result of a depth charge attack or victim of a circular run by one of her own torpedoes.



USS Scamp (SS-277)

Lost on November 9, 1944 with the loss of 83 men near Tokyo Bay on her 8th war patrol. She may have been damaged by a mine and was trailing oil, which helped Japanese coast defense vessels locate her and destroy her with depth charges.



USS Corvina (SS-226)

Lost on November 16, 1943 with the loss of 82 men on her 1st war patrol when she was sunk just south of Truk. Corvina apparently was lost to the torpedoes of a Japanese submarine.



USS Sculpin (SS-191)

Lost on November 19, 1943 with the loss of 40 men near Truk on her 9th war patrol. Severly damaged by depth charges after attacking an enemy convoy, Sculpin continued to fight on the surface. When the captain was killed, the crew abandoned ship and scuttled Sculpin. 41 men were taken prisoner; only 21 survived the war. Among those not abandoning ship was CAPT Cromwell, aboard as a potential wolf pack commander, he rode the Sculpin down, fearing that vital information in his possession might be compromised under torture. For this, CAPT Cromwell was posthumously awarded the Congressional Medal of Honor.



DECEMBER

USS Capelin (SS-289)

Lost on December 2, 1943 with the loss of 76 men on her 2nd war patrol, but her exact location and cause of loss remain a mystery. She may have been lost to mines or an operational casualty.



USS Sealion (SS-195)

Lost on December 10, 1941 with the loss of 5 men. To prevent her from falling into enemy hands, she was scuttled in Manila Bay after incurring severe bomb damage during the initial Japanese attack.



USS F-1 / Carp (SS-20)

Lost on December 17, 1917 with the loss of 19 officers and men when it was sunk after collision with the USS F-3 (Pickerell) (SS-22) off San Clemente, CA.



USS S-4 (SS-109)

Lost on December 17, 1927 with the loss of 34 officers and men when it was sunk after being rammed by USCG Paulding off Cape Cod near Provincetown, MA. Salvaged in 1928 and recommissioned.

END OF AN ERA - SUBMARINE VETERANS OF WWII DISBANDS

The National SVWWII organization, established in 1955 to honor WWII Subvets and remember the submarine men lost in WWII, formally closed its national administration at the joint USSVI-SVWWII Convention in Norfolk this year.

"There are memorials all over this country they've built," said retired Vice Adm. Al Konetzni, who has long been close with the World War II veterans even though he is not of that era. "These guys started in 1955 doing this for their buddies, so they would not be forgotten. It's a wonderful story of self-image. They said, 'Hey, we're going to do it, and we will do it."

Walter "Gus" Kraus, final President of SVWWII said the WWII sub veterans considered themselves a unique group and that uniqueness forged a strong bond. The end of the organization, he said, also represents the "end of an era where we were able to get together and blow our own horn, remembering the circumstances under which we fought."

"They will never be forgotten, ever, ever, ever," said Konetzni, a former deputy commander of U.S. Fleet Forces Command and the U.S. Atlantic Fleet. "They gave us our traditions and our spirit. They were our leaders."

Of the remaining 2,146 WWII members, due to the passage of time and the ravages of age, only 62 were able to attend the closing ceremony.

1,102 of these WWII men are also members of USSVI.

Each of the SVWWII Chapters has the option to continue meeting as a local 'sub club' and all World War II Submariners are always welcome to attend USSVI meetings in their area.

EDITOR'S ADDITION

My wife and I attend our first Submarine Veteran National Convention this year in Norfolk and were thrilled to be there. The highlight had to be the closing ceremony for the Submarine Veterans of WWII. We were very touched by what we saw and we could feel the overwhelming pride in the Subvets of WWII and their organization.

It was our first opportunity to hear retired Vice Adm. Al Konetzni speak, who we came to know as "Big Al the Submariners' Pal." We were excited to hear from Australian Naval Attaché, Commander Matthew Ritchie, who came up to express gratitude from "Down Under" of the sacrifice and successes our shipmates made in WWII to save Australia from the Japanese forces.

Walter "Gus" Kraus, the last SVWWII National President, did well to close out the activities of their organization. He told the members in attendance, "We will always be Submarine Veterans of WWII."



ELIGIBILITY: To have served and qualified on a United States Submarine

MEMBERSHIP RULES: <u>Dues are due by December 31st of each year for National and Base.</u>

BASE ANNUAL DUES: \$15 (nominally, contact your base treasurer for more information)

NATIONAL DUES: Non-Life Member dues are 5 Years = \$90, 3 Years = \$55, or 1 Year = \$20

Life Membership varies with age: Up to 45 years old = \$500, 46-55 = \$400,

56-65 = \$300, 66-75 = \$200, 76 and up = \$100

A Holland Club rocker patch is available for USSVI Subvets who have been qualified in Submarines for 55 year or longer. This patch is worn directly above the Holland Club Patch (see right) and is available in 5 year increments for years 55, 60, 65, 70, and 75.

If you qualified in 1957 or earlier, you are eligible for a patch. Patches have been purchased for primary Tarheel Base members who have already been inducted into Holland Club.



Some patches have already been issued to members who attended recent base meetings. Since it is near the end of the year, some of you will become eligible for a patch in 2013. With this in mind, Jim Davis will be issuing patches representing your status as of 2013 (qual

year 1958 or earlier). For 2013 the years qualified/ qualification year are as follows: 55-1958, 60-1953, 65-1948, 70-1943, 75-1938. If you have already received a patch and are eligible for a new year level, you will receive a new patch. Jim will use the qualification year listed in the USSVI Website Database to determine which patch to issue.

Since I don't see many of you at Base Meetings I must resort to the US Postal Service for distribution. If you would like a patch, please send a stamped, self addressed envelope to me and I will mail you the appropriate patch. A BIT OF HISTORY

Joseph Kelly Ritter has the distinction of both being a plank owner in the U.S. Submarine Veterans of WWII and the 1st president of the Tarheel Chapter. The National Office of USSV-WWII officially disbanded at the joint USSV-WWII and USSVI National Convention held this past September. The Tarheel Chapter closed down back in August 1, 2010.

He joined the Navy in October 1941, qualified in submarines in 1943, and was discharged in October 1947. During this period he served on the USS Kingfish (SS234) from 1942 through 1943 making 5 war patrols. He then served in SubDiv 162 located in Fremantle, Australia as a relief crew member. He went back to sea on the USS Sea Dog (SS-401) serving from 1944 through 1945 making 3 war patrols. He then served on the USS Proteus (AS-19) also in 1945. His last boat was the USS Grouper (SS-214) which he served on from 1946 to 1947 operating out of New London, CT.



He was recalled back in the Navy during the Korean War and was a crew member onboard the USS Calvert (APA-32) from 1950 through 1952.



CHAPLAIN'S CORNER

WHAT "DAILY BREAD" DO WE PRAY FOR?

Prayer plays an active part in your chaplain's life. It has played that role for many, many years.

We recall one night in particular. We were standing the 2400 - 0400 watch in BRILL's forward torpedo room. BRILL was running surfaced, charging batteries. The lights were dim. One of our shipmates had been moved from the crew's quarters in the after battery to the top bunk in the after port corner of the forward torpedo room. He was one sick sailor and we were one praying sailor. We've never prayed so hard in all our life. We don't remember what we prayed, all we remember is that it took a couple days, but our shipmate survived. It was the Lord's will.

But let's update to today. Let's think about Matthew 6:9-13, known traditionally as the Lord's Prayer (more realistically, the Disciples' Prayer). It's one of those prayers most of us can recite by heart, usually in King James English: "Our Father, who art in heaven...." Remember?

So often we recite those words divorced from the context in which they were given. The disciples had asked Jesus to teach them how to pray. Maybe they'd observed their teacher going off by himself to pray and wondered what made his prayer life so compelling. Then again, maybe they just felt the gap in their own experience.

Isn't it interesting that the first request in this prayer is for bread? After the words of praise comes the request for daily bread. Believe it or not, the ordinary, everyday all-too-human stuff of our lives is to be included in our prayers: the insurance payment that's coming due, the car that's becoming increasingly unreliable, and so forth.

To pray about these matters doesn't mean merely sitting around, with hands folded, waiting for the divine lottery check to appear. But over and over again, believers testify that, when they invite God into the daily details of their everyday lives, things just naturally tend to get better: an unexpected door opens, they find strength they didn't know they had, or a new possibility emerges. Because they have turned over their needs to God, they've been able to give up the useless worries and anxiety that do nothing but get in the way.

So, as we pray today (or tonight), we would urge you to pray for your whole life: pray for healing for those who suffer; prayer for peace for those in conflict; and pray for freedom for those bound by outer walls or inner demons.

While we're at it, let's not forget to take a bit of time to pray for our own daily bread.

Medal of Honor Recipient Visits USS North Carolina

PEARL HARBOR, Hawaii (NNS) -- Retired U.S. Army colonel, Vietnam War veteran and Medal of Honor recipient, Jack Howard Jacobs, and a group of distinguished guests who are in Hawaii for the National Medal of Honor Convention, visited the Virginia-class submarine USS North Carolina (SSN 777) for a tour Oct. 5 at Joint Base Pearl Harbor-Hickam.

"It's was an absolute honor to be able to show a true American hero around the boat, and talk to him about what the submarine force does and how we contribute to our country's missions." said Cmdr. Richard G. Rinehart, USS North Carolina commanding officer. "The crew came together. They understood the importance of this opportunity to show this group around, and they enjoyed the chance to show them a little about the submarine force and what we do."

During the tour, the crew of North Carolina explained the difference between Virginia-class submarines and other submarines, submerging and surfacing systems, and basic day-to-day operations on board.

"Coming aboard a ship with the capability of the North Carolina is awe inspiring to me," said Jacobs. "It's hard to believe that only 150 Sailors can control this kind of firepower, and the projection of power around the globe. We are all very lucky to have the North Carolina on our side."

During a battle on March 9, 1968, with the Viet Cong in Kien Phong Province in the Republic of Vietnam, Jacobs, then a 1st Lieutenant, assumed command of an allied company when his command group including his commanding officer took heavy casualties. He ordered a withdrawal from their exposed position and established a defensive perimeter. His Medal of Honor citation goes on to state, "Despite profuse bleeding from head wounds which impaired his vision, Capt. Jacobs, with complete disregard for his safety, returned under intense fire to evacuate a seriously wounded advisor to the safety of a wooded area where he administered lifesaving first aid. He then returned through heavy automatic weapons fire to evacuate the wounded company commander.

Capt. Jacobs made repeated trips across the fire-swept open rice paddies evacuating wounded and their weapons. On three separate occasions, Capt. Jacobs contacted and drove off Viet Cong squads who were searching for allied wounded and weapons, single-handedly killing three and wounding several others. His gallant actions and extraordinary heroism saved the lives of one U.S. advisor and 13 allied soldiers. Through his effort the allied company was restored to an effective fighting unit and prevented defeat of the friendly forces by a strong and determined enemy."

In addition to the Medal of Honor, Jacobs also received two Silver Stars, three Bronze Stars, and two Purple Hearts.

Jacobs, a military analyst with the cable news and information channel, MSNBC, continues to maintain involvement in several military-related organizations.

He is the vice chairman of the Medal of Honor Foundation, a member of the board of trustees for the National World War II Museum and holds the McDermott Chair of Politics at the U.S. Military Academy.

Following the tour, Jacobs spoke about the crew.

"To see a ship where everyone is a well-oiled part of a very sophisticated machine and to recognize that they all work together in such a integrated and sophisticated way gives me a great deal of confidence," said Jacobs.

Measuring 377 feet long and weighing 7,800 tons when submerged, North Carolina is one of the Navy's next generation attack submarines.

North Carolina is capable of supporting a multitude of missions, including anti-submarine warfare, anti-ship warfare, special warfare delivery and support, mine delivery and mine mapping. With enhanced communications connectivity, the submarine will also provide important battle group and joint task force support, with full integration into carrier battle group operations.

PEARL HARBOR, Hawaii (NNS) -- A time-honored change of command ceremony was held aboard the Los Angeles-class submarine USS Charlotte (SSN 766) at the submarine piers at Joint Base Pearl Harbor-Hickam, Oct. 5.

Cmdr. Richard Young, commanding officer of Charlotte was relieved by Cmdr. Andrew T. Miller.

Guest speaker Capt. James C. Childs, Commander of Submarine Squadron One, and Young's former commanding officer and mentor, praised Young for his exceptional performance while in command of Charlotte.

"Cmdr. Young has demonstrated he has a great deal of technical expertise, self-sufficiency, ingenuity, mental toughness, creativity and skill," said Childs. "More importantly, he has imparted these traits to his crew - any captain's ultimate goal."

Following his remarks, Young was awarded the Meritorious Service Medal for his exceptional performance as commanding officer from April 2010 to Oct. 2012.

Young said he was honored to have the opportunity to command Charlotte and acknowledged that the majority of the submarine's success during his time as commanding officer was because of the crew and their hard work.

"The one word I think of to describe this entire crew is commitment," said Young to his assembled crew. "You know what it means to get the job done, and I am extremely proud of how you did that time and time again without complaint."

As Miller assumed command of Charlotte he addressed the crew about the future.

"My message to the men of Charlotte is: be ready," said Miller. "The nation is counting on us to be men of integrity and courage, ready to defend freedom at home and abroad."

Young's personal awards include the Distinguished Service Medal, Meritorious Service Medal (two awards), Navy and Marine Corps Commendation Medal (three awards), Navy Marine Corps Achievement Medal (two awards) as well as numerous unit awards.

Young will report for duty to the office of the Chief of Naval Operations in Washington D.C. for work on current manpower allocation.

KITTERY MOVING CLOSER TO CREATING USS THRESHER MEMORIAL

Portsmouth Patch, October 4, 2012

On April 10, 2013, the Town of Kittery, Maine will honor the sacrifice and the memory of the 129 Navy personnel and civilians who perished on the USS Thresher 50 years ago.

According to the USS Thresher Memorial web site, "Plans are well underway to dedicate a memorial to the sailors and civilians lost in the worst submarine disaster in U.S. history with over \$56,000 cash and in-kind commitments raised toward the initial \$72,000 cost."

When finished, memorial organizers say there will be a 129-foot flagpole at Kittery Memorial Circle, showcased by top-mounted lights 24 hours a day. They say it will also rise from a rounded black granite base surrounded by landscaping ornamentation for a stately tribute, powerful in its simplicity.

USS THRESHER MEMORIAL (Cont.)

"The flagpole height will serve as a permanent reminder of the 129 men who perished that morning, ensuring they will never be forgotten in the town where Thresher was built and homeported," reads the web site.

Currently, the Town of Kittery and the Maine Department of Transportation are planning road, sidewalk, and bridge improvements in the immediate area including a storm water management rain garden that will create an open line of sight between Memorial Circle and the project's proposed Circle of Honor adjacent to Kittery Town Hall, according to the web site.

The USS Thresher was constructed at the Portsmouth Naval Shipyard in Kittery, Maine before it embarked on maiden voyage on April 10, 1963. Somewhere off of Cape Cod, Mass., the vessel took on water and sank, making it one of the worst submarine tragedies in U.S. Naval history. Every Memorial Day, a special ceremony is held at the Albacore Park in Portsmouth to honor all of the submariners who lost their lives, including the men who perished on the USS Thresher.

Support for the project is also gaining some momentum at Portsmouth City Hall after the City Council unanimously approved a resolution to support the memorial. Councilors referred the request from the USS Thresher Memorial group to the city's Veterans Reorganization Committee for further review.

NEWS-01: U.S. Navy Defends Boomer Submarine Replacement Plans

A top U.S. Navy official is defending the service's plans to replace its Ohio-class ballistic missile submarine fleet, saying the Navy has the right design and boat numbers to the mission for decades to come.

"We conducted a detailed analysis of many force structure options," says Rear Adm. Barry Bruner, Navy undersea warfare director, in a recent blog. "A force of 12 Ohio Replacement nuclear-powered ballistic missile submarines (SSBN) with 16 missile tubes satisfies national strategic deterrent requirements at the most affordable cost. Twelve Ohio Replacement SSBNs meet at-sea strategic patrol requirements and sustain this requirement while some of the SSBNs are unavailable due to planned maintenance."

Bruner says, "Reduced-force options [that] we considered failed to meet the current at-sea and nuclear employment requirements, increased risk for force survivability, and limited the flexibility in response to an uncertain strategic future. A 12-ship, 16-missile-tube SSBN force has sufficient, not excessive, flexibility and capacity."

He acknowledges that because ship construction of the Ohio Replacement shifted to 2021 from 2019, there will be fewer than 12 SSBNs from 2029 to 2042 as the Ohio-class retires and Ohio replacement ships join the fleet.

Addressing recent critics of the shortfalls, he says, "During this time frame no major SSBN overhauls are planned, and a force of 10 SSBNs will support current at sea presence requirements."

However, he says, "This provides a low margin to compensate for unforeseen issues that may result in reduced SSBN availability. The reduced SSBN availability during this time frame reinforces the importance of remaining on schedule with the Ohio Replacement program to meet future strategic commitments. As the Ohio Replacement ships begin their mid-life overhauls in 2049, 12 SSBNs will be required to offset ships conducting planned maintenance."

He also says the Navy and Pentagon are keeping a lid on proposed costs. "The Department of Defense sessive cost goal of \$4.9 billion per hull (calendar year 2010) as an average cost for hulls 2-12. To date, the Navy has reduced costs by reducing specifications to the minimum necessary to meet national strategic deterrent requirements, implementing modular construction design, reusing the Trident II D5 Strategic Weapons System, and reusing Virginia- and Ohio-class components where feasible. The Virginia-class construction program, through aggressive management and collaboration between government and industry, has developed into a model ship building program, continually coming in under budget and ahead of schedule. Ohio Replacement design and construction will build on this success."

This 2013 calendar honors the World War II U.S. submariners and their boats. In World War II American submarines spent 31,571 days on patrol in the Pacific, attacking 4,112 Japanese controlled merchant ships with 14,748 torpedoes, which resulted in the sinking of 1,152.5 vessels, totaling 4,859,634 gross tons, or an average of 329.5 tons for every torpedo expended. The loss dates for all U.S. submarines sunk or destroyed are listed in addition to other historic dates in both U.S. Submarine Veteran and U.S. Navy submarine history.

MY RICKOVER ENCOUNTER

The Sand Lance had five reactor operators that qualified RO initially: Jim St. John, Charlie Backes, Newell Crary, Bruce Ward, and John Walsh. As part of the initial engineering testing that goes with a new submarine each shift had to have their qualified reactor operator and shifts perform a fast scram recovery. For you forward types this involved an emergency shutdown of the nuclear reactor and a subsequent fast startup. For all submarines built during this timeframe, Admiral Rickover personally observed these fast scram recoveries. This is about my turn in the barrel, so to speak.

Three of the RO's were selected to perform the fast scram recovery while we were at sea. The admiral had come on board with all his accompanying fanfare and needs. A time was selected and the RO's taken to Machinery Room #2 to await their turn. I do not remember which position I was in, but I do know I was not the first.

I am sure many of you remember how large Maneuvering was (or wasn't) especially the engineering types. When my turn came up, they called me into the Maneuvering Room. Maneuvering normally held four watch standers: The Engineering Officer of the Watch (EOOW), the reactor operator (RO), the electrical plant operator (EO), and the steam plant operator (Throttleman). When I got to Maneuvering there must have been twelve people in the space normally used by four. I managed to squeeze in the room and relieved the watch. Admiral Rickover was in the chair normally used by the EOOW and the EOOW was standing. Also, this was not just the RO that was tested, but the whole shift. So all four watch stations were being relieved. When things settled down a little, someone in Machinery #2 opened the scram breaker for a partial scram, which allowed us to do a fast scram recovery.

When the reactor is shutdown, one of the first things each watch station is required to do is to reduce electrical loads to minimize the heat taken from the reactor and keep it as hot a possible. If the reactor gets below a certain point, the RO is required to do a full scram and we all are in deep dodo. Part of this rig for reduced electrical in the engine room is to shut off the vent fan supplying the Maneuvering Room with cool air. The temperature goes from 72 degrees to 98 degree in about five minutes.

Here we are with the reactor shutdown, the boat rigged for reduced electrical, and a nervous reactor operator (me) asking permission to restart the reactor. This permission is granted by the EOOW and a fast scram recovery is started by ME. A normal reactor startup is not all that eventful; but with Admiral Rickover at my right elbow and not enough room to breathe, things got a little tense. My job was to withdraw the control rods in a manner that led to a controlled, critical reactor and to do a plant heat up within limits. I was doing this when I started "bumping" rods out to control the conditions. Someone, namely Admiral Rickover, did not like the way I was bumping rods and he yelled "You're breaking the machine." I got control of myself and the plant and completed the startup back to initial condition with T_{AVE} (read T average) in the green band, the turbines on line and making a 1/3 bell. At that point I was relieved, in more than one way, and got the hell out of Maneuvering.

I think I have told that story about a hundred times over the years about how I got yelled at by Admiral Rickover.
