## **LOST SUBMARINES - THIRD QUARTER**

## **JULY**

#### USS S-28 (SS-133)

Lost on July 4, 1944 with the loss of 50 crew members. She was conducting training exercises off Hawaii with the US Coast Guard Cutter Reliance. After S-28 dove for a practice torpedo approach, Reliance lost contact. No distress signal or explosion was heard. Two days later, an oil slick was found in the area where she had been operating. The exact cause of her loss remains a mystery.



## U.S. Submarine Veterans of World War II assigned USS S-28 (SS-133) to the State of North Carolina









The official memorial to the S-28 is located in Riverside Park, adjacent to the Battleship USS North Carolina (BB 55) in Wilmington, NC. It was dedicated by the NC Subvets in May 2007.



# **JULY (cont.)**

#### USS Robalo (SS-273)

Lost on July 26, 1944 with the loss of 84 crew members while on her 3<sup>rd</sup> war patrol. She struck a mine about 2 miles off the coast of Palawan. Three men survived and swam ashore, then imprisoned by the Japanese. Unfortunately, they were put on a Japanese destroyer and lost when that destroyer was sunk.



#### USS Grunion (SS-216)

Lost on July 30, 1942 with the loss of 70 crew members while on her first war patrol near Kiska Harbor. She radioed that she sank two sub-chasers and damaged a third, but was never heard from again. Her loss remains a mystery.



# **LOST SUBMARINES – THIRD QUARTER (cont.)**

## **AUGUST**

#### USS Bullhead (SS-332)

Lost on August 6, 1945 with the loss of 84 crew members in the Lombok Strait while on her 3<sup>rd</sup> war patrol when sunk by a depth charge dropped by a Japanese Army plane. Bullhead was the last submarine lost during WWII.



#### USS Flier (SS-250)

Lost on August 13, 1944, with the loss of 80 crew members while on her 2<sup>nd</sup> war patrol. Flier was transiting on the surface when she was rocked by a massive explosion (probably a mine) and sank within less than a minute. 13 survivors, some injured, made it into the water and swam to shore. 8 survived and 6 days later friendly natives guided them to a Coast Watcher and they were evacuated by the USS Redfin.



#### USS S-39 (SS-144)

Lost on August 14, 1942 after grounding on a reef off Rossel Island (Yela), New Guinea while on her 5<sup>th</sup> war patrol. The entire crew was able to get off and rescued by the HMAS Katoomba.



#### USS Harder (SS-257)

Lost on August 24, 1944 with the loss of 84 crew members from a depth charge attack by a minesweeper near Bataan while on her 6<sup>th</sup> war patrol. Harder had won a Presidential Unit Citation for her first 5 war patrols and CDR Dealey was awarded the Congressional Medal of Honor posthumously. Harder is tied for 9<sup>th</sup> in the number of enemy ships sunk.



#### USS Cochino (SS-345)

Lost on August 26, 1949 after being jolted by a violent polar gale off Norway caused an electrical fire and battery explosion that generated hydrogen and chlorine gasses. In extremely bad weather, men of Cochino and Tusk (SS-426) fought to save the submarine for 14 hours. After a 2<sup>nd</sup> battery explosion, Abandon Ship was ordered and Cochino sank. Tusk's crew rescued all of Cochino's men except for one civilian engineer. Six sailors from Tusk were lost during the rescue.



#### USS Pompano (SS-181)

Lost on August 29, 1943 with the loss of 76 men while on her 7<sup>th</sup> war patrol. Before being lost, she sank two enemy cargo ships. The exact cause of her loss remains unknown, but she probably fell victim to a mine.



## **SEPTEMBER**

## USS S-5 (SS-110)

Lost on September 1, 1920 when a practice dive went wrong and she sank bow-first, with her stem showing above the water. In a dramatic adventure, her exhausted crew was rescued during the next few days. Salvage attempts were unsuccessful. S-5 settled to the bottom and was abandoned.



## USS Grayling (SS-209)

Lost on September 9, 1943 with the loss of 76 men near the Tablas Strait. Grayling was on her 8<sup>th</sup> war patrol and sank two ships before being lost. Her loss may have been operational or by an unrecorded attack.

# **SEPTEMBER (cont.)**

#### USS S-51 (SS-162)

Lost on September 25, 1925 with the loss of 32 men when it was sunk after collision with SS City of Rome off Block Island.



## USS Cisco (SS-290)

Lost on September 28, 1943 on her first war patrol with the loss of 76 men in the Sulu Sea west of Mindinao possibly sunk by Japanese bombs and depth charges.

# **COASTAL CAROLINA BASE**

We are very excited about our 15+ foot long submarine float and have enjoyed a great deal of positive feedback.

Much planning, effort and MONEY went into obtaining the submarine from a company in High Point, NC. They worked with our team to come up with the desired dimensions and size etc. Once we received notice it was completed we had to move it to Wilmington. A member had an enclosed car transport that he loaned to the team. One member reported that moving the enclosed trailer was like pulling a house down the road and all for a 50 pound model.

Once in Wilmington, the team had to come up with solutions to two more big problems: how to coat (protect) the Styrofoam from damage and how to display it so people could see it during a parade. The team came up with the LineX paint as a solution to the protection problem. LineX is hard, durable and available. It seems to be the perfect coating for our model. The LineX coating added about 150# to the submarine. After many suggestions, the solution for a display stand was settled on and fabricated. The submarine was mounted on the display stand and attached to the trailer that would be used for the parade. During this time one of our members loaned us his trailer. This was a generous offer since we have had the trailer for several months now.

While all this work was being planned and carried out, designs were settled on for the banners that we would use to decorate the sides of the float. We had two pairs of banners made: one to identify us with our base patch and the other to remember the S28 submarine that was lost many years ago. Besides the banners made to identify ourselves, we came up with some bunting, and flags to display on the float.

We will be storing the submarine in Carolina Beach between parades. There are at least two parades that I am aware of that we will be using the float. If other opportunities present themselves to us we may use it then.

We are also excited about the golf tournament we are sponsoring on September 28<sup>th</sup> at Echo Farms. If any person reading the newsletter is interested in supporting us in this manner or



# **CHAPLAIN'S CORNER**

#### **NOBODY WANTS TO DIE!**

Your Chaplain is not a morbid person.

However, he does have a good enough reason for exploring that part of life in this Column.

That he just returned from another memorial service -- he prefers to call it a celebration of life -- is perhaps reason enough for this exploration.

As he likes to do, he starts most of his written thoughts with a scriptural quote. This time it's from 1 Corinthians 15:42 and goes something like this: "This is how it will be when the dead are raised to life." The exact wording varies with the translation used.

Sometimes it helps to view troublesome questions through the eyes of others.

Your Chaplain recently read an unusual portrayal of death by the American author, educator, and clergyman Henry van Dyke (1852-1933). It goes like this:

"I am standing upon the seashore. A ship at my side spreads her white sails to the morning breeze and heads for the blue ocean. She is an object of beauty and strength, and I stand and watch until at last she hangs like a speck of white cloud just where the sea and sky come down to mingle with each other.

Then someone at my side says, 'There! She's gone!' Gone where? Gone from my sight, that is all.

She is just as large in mast, hull, and spar as she was when she left my side and just as able to bear her load of living freight to her destination. Her diminished size is in me, not in her.

And just at the moment when that someone at my side says, 'There she goes!' other eyes are watching her approach and other voices are ready to take up the joyous shout, 'Here she comes!'"

If you have any difficulty visualizing the just-described scene, try substituting a submarine for that sailing vessel. Or, better yet, substitute the submariners' families uttering both the usually sad "There, she's gone!" and the joyous "Here she comes!"

Ever notice how everybody wants to go to Heaven, but hardly anybody wants to die?

Frankly, your Chaplain favors the expression "On Eternal Patrol," as so often used by submariners to express that experience that will face each one of us some day.





## **NAVY MAY LET WOMEN SERVE ON MORE SUBMARINES**

The Navy will decide by March 2015 whether women will be allowed to serve on more classes of submarines.

The Navy announced in January that female officers would begin reporting to Virginia-class attack submarines in fiscal year 2015, and, as the next step, enlisted women would be considered for sub duty.

On Tuesday, the Department of Defense released its plans for allowing women to serve in positions throughout the military that currently are closed to them. The Navy's plan explains the timeline for opening all occupations to women and nearly all of the closed positions, including several aboard submarines.

Female officers can serve on each type of submarine: fast-attack, ballistic-missile and guided-missile. The Navy is now considering whether they will be assigned to Los Angeles and Seawolf-class fast-attack submarines, in addition to Virginia class, according to the plan.

The Naval Submarine Base in Groton is home to both Los Angeles and Virginia-class submarines.

The first two Virginia-class submarines where women will serve will be selected in the third quarter of this year, and female officers will report aboard in January 2015.

Enlisted jobs on submarines currently are closed to women, but the plan states that the Navy is studying whether to assign women to these jobs on submarine classes besides the Virginia class and will decide by March 2015.

Vice Adm. Michael J. Connor, commander of the submarine force, created a task force of senior officers in May to figure out how to bring enlisted women aboard submarines. Rear Adm. Kenneth Perry, commander of Submarine Group Two, is leading the group. A comprehensive "Plan of Actions and Milestones" is due by January 2014.

A new ballistic-missile submarine, which Electric Boat is currently designing, will accommodate officers and enlisted sailors of both genders, according to the Navy. EB will figure out how to do so during the ship's detailed arrangement phase, which will begin next year and continue through 2020.

The fifth block of Virginia-class submarines, which includes 12 boats starting in fiscal 2019, also will be gender-neutral, the Navy said.

The Navy lifted its ban on women serving aboard submarines in 2010 and started assigning female officers first to the larger, ballistic-missile and guided-missile submarines. In January, then-Defense Secretary Leon E. Panetta and Army Gen. Martin E. Dempsey, chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, rescinded the 1994 Direct Ground Combat Definition and Assignment Rule, which barred women from combat jobs.

Each service and the U.S. Special Operations Command must fully implement its plan by Jan. 1, 2016.

I ask each Base and Holland Club member to support the Holland Club and make a well needed donation to and for the Holland Club.



# SUB CO TALKS WATCHBILL CHANGES, PORT VISITS [EXCERPT]

ABOARD THE ATTACK SUBMARINE NORFOLK - For decades, submariners have lived in flux, shifting between 18-hour days on deployment and 24-hour days in port.

That may soon change because of guidance issued to the sub fleet that allows, but doesn't require, submariners to stand longer watches. Boats now can try an eight-hours-on, 16-hours-off watchbill that matches a 24-hour day.

One Los Angeles-class attack sub, the Scranton, has already done so with positive results. Another, the Norfolk, may give the new watchbill a shot on its next deployment, expected to begin late this year or early next.

Back on Nov 3rd 2012 I sent out a Flash traffic POC concerning the New associate member process due to the 2012 Constitution change. I am now resending it as reminder so we can keep this process running smoothly. This will also go out as an E-gram to all Base Commanders and Base membership Chairman. See below:

#### Associate Members:

- 1. As a reminder due to changes in the C&B's NEW Associate Members can no longer be Life Members of USSVI or a Base. Old Associate members are grandfathered in.
- 2. For a NON Family member Associate members you must E-mail or snail mail to the NJVC a letter of recommendation of why this Non family member Associate supports or has interest in USSVI as per our Constitution Article VII Membership, Section 5 Associates Member, C&D before you send in his/her application and dues money to the National Office.
- C. A Regular Member may also sponsor one additional non-family related U.S. Military service member, Active or Veteran, for Associate Membership, who has demonstrated a strong interest and support of the US Submarine Service by their deeds or actions, subject to prior approval by the National Membership Chair. If separated from service, it must have been under honorable circumstances.
- D. Some examples of interest and support: Submarine Book author, Sub Tender service, Intel Rider, Museum submarine docent, Submarine Historian or provides some other demonstrated service to advance the US Submarine force, subject to prior approval by the National Membership Chair.
- 3. All Associate Member Application either by mail or online will be rejected if they do not have a SPONSOR on the application.
- 4. Any Non Life Associate Member without a SPONSOR on the first week of February of each year will be removed from USSVI for violation of the USSVI C&B's. The NJVC will provide this information to the Bases in a timely manner so the Bases can make corrections before the February dead line.
- 5. A son or daughter of a SVWWII may become an Associate Member of USSVI even if the SVWWII is not a member of USSVI. If he or she served in the military they must have had an Honorable Discharge. This is another example for D.

1MC	The basic one-way communications system on a vessel. Reaches all spaces on a ship. Used
	for general announcements, and to transmit general alarm system signals. Control stations are

located on the bridge, quarterdeck, and control.

A-Gang Auxiliary Division (Engineering Department). These personnel operate and maintain the ship's

auxiliary equipment (air conditioning systems, distilling units, air compressors)

Head The bathroom aboard a Navy ship. Comes from days of sailing ships when the place for the

crew to relieve themselves was all the way forward on either side of the bowsprit, the integral

part of the hull to which the figurehead was fastened.

Navy Shower A water-saving evolution in which one attempts to get reasonably clean while using as little

water as possible. Basically, you wet yourself down, turn off the shower, lather up, then turn

the shower back on to rinse off.

## **Asheville Visits Subic During Western Pacific Deployment**

SUBIC BAY, Republic of the Philippines – The Los Angeles class submarine USS Asheville (SSN 758) arrived at Subic Bay June 8 for a visit, as part of its deployment to the Western Pacific.

With a crew of approximately 150, Asheville will conduct a multitude of missions and showcase the latest capabilities of the submarine fleet.

"I am very proud of my talented crew aboard Asheville," said Cmdr. Douglas Bradley, Asheville's commanding officer. "They have worked extremely hard to prepare for maritime security operations in the Western Pacific. This port visit to the Republic of the Philippines highlights our nations' commitment to regional security partnerships with our Pacific allies, while providing a great cultural experience for my crew."

Measuring more than 360 feet long and weighing more than 6900 tons when submerged, Asheville is one of the most advanced submarines in the world. The submarine is capable of supporting a multitude of missions, including anti-submarine warfare, anti-surface ship warfare, strike, naval special warfare involving special operations forces, intelligence, surveillance and reconnaissance.

"The crew has been working extremely hard to get the Asheville ready for deployment," said Chief of the Boat Roger Skeens. "This port visit to Subic Bay will allow for much deserved rest and liberty for our men."

For many of the crew members, this is their first time visiting Subic Bay.

"I am excited to pull into Subic Bay, represent the United States, and experience the culture of the Philippines," said Hospital Corpsman 1<sup>st</sup> Class Andrew Blalock, Asheville's Sailor of the Year.

Asheville's Filipino American crew members, like Fire Control Technician Seaman Ryan Santos, will have the opportunity to explore their homeland and reconnect with their local relatives.

"I am excited to come back home to the Philippines to reconnect with my heritage, and visit my family while I am here." said Santos.

Asheville is the 47<sup>th</sup> submarine of its class, and its capabilities include the submarine advanced combat control system, advanced rapid commercial off the shelf insertion sonar system, and superior electronic support measures capability. In addition to these tactical advances, retractable bow plans and a hardened sail provide the capability of operating in any of the world's oceans, including the Arctic Basin.

Home ported in San Diego, Calif., Asheville is part of Submarine Squadron Eleven.

# Ceremony honors memory of lost submarine veteran

eterans of the submarine service paid tribute Saturday to one of their own who gave the ultimate sacrifice 70 years ago during World War II.

At a special ceremony Saturday afternoon, the U.S. Submarine Veterans of North Carolina presented Eileen Torrence of the North Cove community with a book of remembrance containing old photographs, historical information and written tributes about her late father, Robert D. Bissell. She was also given a special plaque from the Submarine Veterans of North Carolina.

Saturday's ceremony was held at the McDowell County Chamber of Commerce's Visitors Center. It came complete with a traveling replica of a torpedo and a submarine. Veterans on motorcycles were there too in a caravan.

The purpose of the presentation

remembrance and a plaque to Eileen Torrence in memory of her late father Robert Bissell. The presentation was made at the McDowell Chamber of Commerce's Visitors Center, where Torrence is a volunteer. and the ceremony was to honor the memory of her father.

"Bless his soul, he was a real hero and a hero to all veterans every-where," said 88-year-old Joe Clark, a Greensboro resident and a member of the Submarine Veterans. He too served aboard a submarine during World War II.

But unlike Bissell, Clark survived the treacherous waters of the Pacific Ocean. Bissell and the other crewmen of the USS Pompano perished when their submarine sank off the coast of Honshu, Japan in September 1943. They were all lost at sea.

Saturday's ceremony came about

almost by accident. One day about three years ago, Clark and two other submarine veterans, Edward Galaviz and Tom Ritchey, were all traveling through McDowell County. They were looking for a memorial to submarine veterans which is located in nearby Burnsville. The privately-built memorial was constructed by a fellow veteran who wanted to honor his comrades. Since then, the new owner of the property has deeded the place to the U.S. Submarine Veterans of North Carolina

On that day three years ago, the three men stopped at the McDowell Chamber's Visitors center to inquire about how to get to Burnsville and the memorial. Torrence, who is a Chamber volunteer, happened to be working that day. She did not know about the memorial. But she noticed their commemorative shirts and vests and said that she was the daughter of a submarine veteran who died in World War II.

Torrence was very young when her father went off to serve his country, and she does not have many memories of him. The Submarine Veterans of North Carolina were moved by that and decided to put together a book of remembrance for not only Torrence but her sister Janet Hanson, who lives in San Diego, Calif. The book contains

articles and photographs compiled about Robert Dudley Bissell and the USS Pompano. A native of Minneapolis, Minn., Bissell was a seaman first class aboard the Pompano, which operated out of Pearl Harbor in Hawaii during the war. After the Japanese attacked Pearl Harbor on Dec. 7, 1941, the Pompano was sent on its first war patrol and was ordered to reconnoiter the Marshall Islands. The sub went out on more war patrols in the Japanese home waters and off the Marshall Islands. The underwater vessel and its crew sank or damaged numerous Japanese ships in the Pacific Theater of the war, according to the remembrance book.

On Aug. 20, 1943, the Pompano left Midway Island bound for the Japanese islands of Hokkaido and Honshu. The submarine was never heard from again and

was presumed lost by the Navy. It is believed that the Pompano and its crew were sunk when it either hit a Japanese mine floating on the water or was struck with depth charges It could have been sunk by a Japanese air attack.

In any case, Torrence's father never came home, not even in a coffin. He and the rest of the Pompano's crew are presumed to be resting at the bottom of the Pacific Ocean. They are "on eternal patrol," as the submarine veterans say.

During World War II, a total of 52 U.S. submarines were lost. When the Submarine Veterans of World War II was started, they assigned a lost sub to each state. The USS Pompano was assigned to Kentucky. Today, a memorial to this lost ship and its crew stands in Frankfort, Ky. California and New York got two submarines each.

Every year, the U.S. Submarine Veterans holds ceremonies to remember those who have perished beneath the waves and who are "on eternal patrol.

"This means that your father will be honored every year," reads a letter from the association to Torrence and her sister Janet. "He will always be our hero for giving up his life so that we can all enjoy ours.

On Saturday, the U.S. Submarine Veterans of North Carolina participated in the Independence Celebration Parade in Troutman and then made their way to Marion so they could present the book of remembrance to Torrence. She was joined by her husband, John Torrence, who is a distinguished Marine fighter pilot from World War II. Her sister in San Diego will receive a similar book of remembrance.

"I just think it's wonderful," she said Thursday. "A lot of things have come

up."
"Your father was special," said Clark to the daughter of a lost submariner.

## NAVY DEVELOPS TORPEDO KILLING TORPEDO

The Navy has taken its first steps to develop a weapon designed to intercept and destroy guided enemy torpedoes immune to U.S. countermeasures, Naval Sea Systems Command officials told USNI News on Wednesday.

The Surface Ship Torpedo Defense (SSTD) program under development to protect high dollar surface warships - like the Navy's Nimitz-class (CVN-71) nuclear aircraft carriers - from Soviet developed torpedoes specifically designed to attack large ships like aircraft carriers and large civilian oil tankers.

The tests - conducted in May onboard the USS George H.W. Bush (CVN-77) - pair a Torpedo Warning System (TWS) towed behind the ship with a highly maneuverable Countermeasure Anti-Torpedo (CAT) that seeks and destroys the incoming enemy weapon. The CAT is currently being developed by the Pennsylvania State University Applied Research Laboratory.

The torpedo warning system is towed behind the ship. When the TWS detects an enemy weapon an operator on the ship decides whether or not to launch the CAT, NAVSEA told USNI News.

Development of the SSTD helps cover a serious threat to major U.S. ships from Soviet-designed torpedoes initially developed in the 1960s, naval analyst Norman Friedman told USNI News.

"Torpedoes are an often-unappreciated threat to surface ships," he said.

"The usual countermeasures are noisemakers intended to decoy an approaching homing torpedo. Unfortunately the Russians use wake-following torpedoes that do not respond to the usual countermeasures at all."

The Russian Type-53 torpedo includes sensors that detect the churn made by ships underway. Once the torpedo senses the chopped water it will follow a ship in an S-pattern between the wakes until it finds its targets.

"Anyone who buys Russian Kilo-class submarines - almost anyone the U.S. would come into conflict with - uses torpedoes which do not respond to U.S. torpedo countermeasures," Friedman said.

Russia has heavily exported the Kilo diesel/electric submarine to Southeast Asia and the attack boat is a mainstay of navies in Vietnam, India and China.

The Chinese People's Liberation Army Navy fields 12 Kilos with Soviet-era Type 53-65 wake homing torpedoes with a range of 11.8 miles, according to the soon to be released 16th edition of the Naval Institute Guide to Combat Fleets of the World.

The Type 53-65 torpedoes, in wide use around the world, were developed in the mid 1960s and were the first Russian mass produced torpedo to include the wake homing technology, according to Jane's Weapons: Naval.

As conflicts in the South China Sea intensify and the Pentagon shifts more forces to the Pacific, submarines have been high on the wish lists for countries in the region.

In 2007, a PLAN Song-class submarine surfaced near now-decommissioned USS Kitty Hawk (CV-63), raising questions how effective the Navy was at defending its carrier fleet.

Chief of Naval Operations, Adm. Jonathan Greenert, has called for increased research and development into antitorpedo torpedoes since he took the top Navy job in 2011.

NAVSEA has more testing for the SSTD system scheduled for this year and plans to have the CAT and TWS reach so-called initial operational capability by 2019 and Fleet wide adoption of the system by 2035.
