LOST SUBMARINES - FOURTH QUARTER

OCTOBER

USS Seawolf (SS-197)

Lost on October 3, 1944 with the loss of 102 officers and men on her 15th war patrol when she was sunk just north of Moritai by USS Rowell, a Destroyer Escort (DE). In this tragic error, Rowell mistook Seawolf for a Japanese submarine that had just sunk another Destroyer. Seawolf ranks 7th for enemy ships sunk.



USS S-44 (SS-155)

Lost on October 7, 1943 with the loss of 56 men when it was sunk off Paramushiru, Kuriles. S-44 was on her 5th war patrol after attacking a target thought to be a merchant on the surface, S-44 found herself in a losing gun battle with a heavily armed Japanese destroyer. Two men were taken prisoner and survived the war.



USS Wahoo (SS-238)

Lost on October 11, 1943 with the loss of 79 men near La Perouse Strait. Under command of one of the great sub skippers of World War II, LCDR "Mush" Morton, Wahoo was on her 7th war patrol. Wahoo had won a Presidential Unit Citation and ranks 5th in the number of enemy ships sunk. She was lost to depth charges dropped by a Japanese patrol aircraft.



USS Dorado (SS-248)

Lost on October 12, 1943 with the loss of 78 when she was sunk in the western Atlantic near Cuba. Newly commissioned, she had departed New London and was en route to Panama. She may have been sunk by a U.S. patrol plane that received faulty instructions regarding bombing restriction areas or a German U-boat that was in the vicinity.



USS Escolar (SS-294)

Lost on October 17, 1944 with the loss of 82 men. She was on her 1st war patrol and was most likely lost to a mine somewhere in the Yellow Sea.



USS Shark II (SS-314)

Lost on October 24, 1944 with the loss of 90 when she was sunk near Hainan. The second boat to carry this name during World War II, she was on her 3rd war patrol. Shark was sunk by escorts after attacking and sinking a lone freighter. Compounding the tragedy, it turned out that the freighter had 1800 U.S. POWs on board.



USS Darter (SS-227)

Lost on October 24, 1944 when she became grounded on Bombay Shoal off Palawan and was then destroyed to prevent her falling into enemy hands intact. The entire crew was rescued by USS Dace. Winner of one Navy Unit Commendation, Darter had sunk a heavy cruiser and damaged another and went aground while attempting an "end around" on an enemy formation in hopes of getting in an attack on a battleship.



USS Tang (SS-306)

Lost on October 25, 1944 with the loss of 80 men in the Formosa Strait while on her 5th war patrol. Tang ranks 2nd in the number of ships sunk and 4th in tonnage, and had won two Presidential Unit Citations. During a daring night surface attack, Tang was lost to a circular run by one of her own torpedoes. Nine of the crew were taken prisoner, including CDR. O'Kane and five who had gained the surface from her final resting place 180 feet below. All survived the war, and CDR O'Kane was awarded the Congressional Medal of Honor.



USS 0-5 (SS-66)

Lost on October 29, 1923 with the loss of 3 men when rammed and sunk by SS Ababgarez off the Panama Canal.



LOST SUBMARINES - FOURTH QUARTER (cont.)

NOVEMBER

USS Albacore (SS-218)

Lost on November 7, 1944 with the loss of 86 men when she was sunk off northern Hokkaido. Winner of two Presidential Unit Citations, Albacore was on her 11th war patrol and struck a mine while running submerged near a Japanese patrol craft that had detected her.



USS Growler (SS-215)

Lost on November 8, 1944 with the loss of 84 men when she was sunk in the South China Sea. Winner of two Navy Unit Commendations, Growler was on her 11th war patrol, and was lost while attacking a convoy, probably as a result of a depth charge attack or victim of a circular run by one of her own torpedoes.



USS Scamp (SS-277)

Lost on November 9, 1944 with the loss of 83 men near Tokyo Bay on her 8th war patrol. She may have been damaged by a mine and was trailing oil, which helped Japanese coast defense vessels locate her and destroy her with depth charges.



USS Corvina (SS-226)

Lost on November 16, 1943 with the loss of 82 men on her 1st war patrol when she was sunk just south of Truk. Corvina apparently was lost to the torpedoes of a Japanese submarine.



USS Sculpin (SS-191)

Lost on November 19, 1943 with the loss of 40 men near Truk on her 9th war patrol. Severly damaged by depth charges after attacking an enemy convoy, Sculpin continued to fight on the surface. When the captain was killed, the crew abandoned ship and scuttled Sculpin. 41 men were taken prisoner; only 21 survived the war. Among those not abandoning ship was CAPT Cromwell, aboard as a potential wolf pack commander, he rode the Sculpin down, fearing that vital information in his possession might be compromised under torture. For this, CAPT Cromwell was posthumously awarded the Congressional Medal of Honor.



DECEMBER

USS Capelin (SS-289)

Lost on December 2, 1943 with the loss of 76 men on her 2nd war patrol, but her exact location and cause of loss remain a mystery. She may have been lost to mines or an operational casualty.



USS Sealion (SS-195)

Lost on December 10, 1941 with the loss of 5 men. To prevent her from falling into enemy hands, she was scuttled in Manila Bay after incurring severe bomb damage during the initial Japanese attack.



USS F-1 / Carp (SS-20)

Lost on December 17, 1917 with the loss of 19 officers and men when it was sunk after collision with the USS F-3 (Pickerell) (SS-22) off San Clemente, CA.



USS S-4 (SS-109)

Lost on December 17, 1927 with the loss of 34 officers and men when it was sunk after being rammed by USCG Paulding off Cape Cod near Provincetown, MA. Salvaged in 1928 and recommissioned.

SUBVETS ENJOY REUNION AT KINGS BAY

"Is what we did important? Will we be remembered?"

Those questions were the theme of guest speaker Capt. Stephen Gillespie at the United States Submarine Force World War II Memorial Service Nov. 1, at the World War II Submarine Veterans Memorial Pavilion, on board Naval Submarine Base Kings Bay.

The answer, ultimately, to both is yes, said the deputy commander and chief of staff for Submarine Group Ten.

More than two dozen of the crowd of submarine veterans served during World War II.

Gillespie said he was in awe to be in their company.

A World War II Navy study reports "of the total 288 U.S. submarines deployed, including those stationed in the Atlantic, 52 submarines were lost with 48 lost in the Pacific. American submariners, who comprised only 1.6 percent of the Navy, suffered the highest loss rate in the U.S. Armed Forces, with 22 percent killed."

Nearly 3,500 World War II submarine Sailors are on Eternal Patrol.

But, the report further states "the Japanese Merchant Marine lost 8.1 million tons of vessels during the war, with submarines accounting for 4.9 million tons, or 60 percent, of losses.

Additionally, U.S. submarines sank 700,000 tons of naval ships, about 30 percent of the total lost, including eight aircraft carriers, one battleship and 11 cruisers."

Patrick Zilliacus, an 87-year-old veteran of the USS Spot (SS 413) was one of the World War II submariners in attendance.

"It was a lovely ceremony and this is a beautiful base," said Zilliacus, who is still active as the chairman of the Columbia College Hollywood Film and TV School. "It's always wonderful to come here and see my shipmates."

A USS Spot shipmate, 92-year-old Charles Crews of Conyers, Ga., agreed. "It couldn't have been better," he said. "I really enjoyed the memorial. I hope I make the next one."

About 230 Sub Vets and their family members were in attendance.

Gillespie paid tribute as well to a larger crowd of Cold War-era submariners, as well as today's force, for the sacrifices and hardships they've faced.

Friday's World War II Memorial Service was followed at Trident Training Facility by a lunch, hosted by the TTF Chief Petty Officers Association, and tours.

Friday evening, a steak dinner sponsored by Trident Refit Facility Chief Petty Officer Association was at the Kings Bay Goat Locker.

The Order of the Eagle's hosted a Low Country Boil at the Eagle's Club in St. Marys Saturday, Nov. 2.

The Commanding Officer's Breakfast at the NSB Kings Bay Pirates Cove Galley started events Thursday. Later that day there was a meet-and-greet barbecue sponsored by Naval Submarine Support Center at Cumberland Inn and Suites.

Veterans and families also were able to tour the USS Alaska (SSBN 732) Thursday and Friday.

During the 'Working Party' the Sea Cadets would ask questions and the Vets would answer each one "Sea Stories", the Vets would also ask questions and the Cadets would look at the Sea Cadet Chief (we all remember the time we looked at the Chief for the right answer), the Chief would give the look "well?" and the next thing everyone was talking and working like a true "Working Party".

The USS Asheville Base and the Asheville Sea Cadets departed for the day after taking a few photos with a hand shake and a promise to pull together next year before April to do a good cleanup. All-in-All I would say it was a Great Time!



THE BOOK OF REVELATION

It's Wednesday, so around suppertime found wife Anne and me at Church, expecting nothing more than a delicious meal.

How could I not keep my mind for the rest of the study to keep my attention riveted on how the Pastor would explain the presence of what had to be a submarine in both the Old (Daniel) and New (Revelation) Testaments. I guess he'll keep that for next week's session.

Unfortunately, that's not the end of my tale.

When we returned home this evening, my curiosity got the better of me. Where in Daniel and Revelation are words to support "a boastful beast that rises out of the ocean" to be found? I just had to look.

THE SILENT SERVICE TV Series Available

Thanks to the generosity of USSVI Northern VA Base member Ray Stone, the following episodes are available for downloading at this site are from the submarine adventure series 'The Silent Service' which aired during the

1957-1958 television seasons.

The Silent Service is a documentary styled anthology series about the U.S.

Navy's submarine fleet and their missions during World War II and the Korean War. Every episode was fact based and the realism of the show was elevated by the use of actual combat footage from the files of the United States Navy.

The stories, which varied between the South Pacific during World War II, the Atlantic campaign and the Korean War, were the brainchild of Rear Admiral Thomas T. M. Dykers, himself a WWII submariner who commanded USS Jack

(SS-259) and retired from the Navy in 1949 after 22 years of service.

Admiral Dykers also did an intro piece for each episode, narrated the action and filmed a closing segment, usually with a member of the crew of the submarine that was highlighted on that particular episode.

Each season was comprised of 39 episodes. All of the episodes for season one are complete, however there are three missing episodes for season two. If anyone has copies or knows where they are available, please let Ray know.

In addition to the episodes, Ray has included copies of the press kits that were issued to the stations along with the films. He also included episode summaries which are handy in preparing notices / programs for individual viewing.

All episodes are in MP4 format. Ray suggests downloading to your device rather than trying to view online. Each episode is about 30 min. in length so consider that when trying to download.

NEWS-03: NINE DIGIT ZIP CODES FOR FPO/APO Submitted by: T. Michael Bircumshaw on 9/16/2013

FPO/APO Require a Nine-Digit Zip

Week of September 16, 2013

Sailors not receiving mail as expected should remind senders about the United States Postal Service (USPS) requirement to use the nine-digit ZIP code on all mail sent to FPO and APO addresses. Every mobile unit - ships, squadrons, detachments, et cetera, and OCONUS Shore installations - has a unique nine-digit ZIP code. In January 2013, all FPO and APO mail began routing through USPS automated mail sorting equipment at a consolidated mail processing operation in Chicago, III., which reads mail for the nine-digit ZIP code, rejecting mail not addressed with the nine-digit ZIP code. Units or commands unsure of their proper nine-digit ZIP code should contact their local Military Postal Service Representative. USPS addressing tips, guidelines, and restrictions for FPO and APO mail are available at the United States Postal Service website.

I have finally gotten most of the information on the Washington, DC National Memorial Day Parade on Monday, May 26, 2014. We have to apply for it and be APPROVED to march in the Parade. Each year, more than 250,000 spectators and 3000 participants convene in Washington, DC to honor our heroes who have worn the uniform.

At the present time there will be very limited space for those members who cannot walk the one mile length of the parade. Parking will be very limited anywhere near the parade and most of us will have to use the Metro subway to get to the parade and walk maybe a half mile or more to the location where we form up for the parade. I also need to know how many bases would be willing to bring a float and I need a picture of the float with the tow vehicle. I am also in need of a color guard for our unit in the parade. This information needs to be sent to me at al@ssbn657.com no later than October 24, 2013, as I want to put our Parade Application in before the end of October. Note: Bases do not have to put in an application for the parade as this is being handled by National and would cause problems with our approval process. WOMEN TO BE ASSIGNED TO FAST-ATTACK SUBMARINES BY JANUARY 2015

The USS Virginia and the USS Minnesota will be the first two gender-integrated fast-attack submarines, the Navy announced Tuesday.

Six women - four nuclear-trained officers and two supply corps officers - will report to the subs by January 2015, after completing the nuclear submarine training pipeline, according to the Navy.

Women are already serving aboard the ballistic missile subs the USS Wyoming, USS Louisiana and USS Maine, and the guided missile subs USS Florida, USS Georgia and USS Ohio.

The Navy in 2010 officially changed the policy that had previously prohibited women from serving aboard submarines. Since then, 43 women have been integrated into the sub force.

"Female officers serving aboard Virginia-class submarines is the next natural step to more fully integrate women into the submarine force," Navy Secretary Ray Mabus said in a written statement. "There are many extremely talented and capable women with a desire to succeed in this field and the submarine force will be stronger because of their efforts."

In an all-hands call last week, Chief of Naval Operations Jonathan Greenert told sailors that the Navy will lay out a plan by May 2015 for integrating enlisted women into the submarine force. It is important to add female officers first, he said, so that younger sailors will have role models at sea.

"But the fact of the matter is, we're going to do this," he said.

Vice Adm. Michael Conner, commander of Navy submarine forces, said he plans to integrate two more fast-attack submarines in fiscal 2016. Virginia and Minnesota are both home-ported in Groton, Conn., so he said he plans to choose two Pacific Fleet submarines home-ported in Pearl Harbor, Hawaii, in early 2014.

In May 2012, some of the first women to serve aboard U.S. submarines said the transition was going smoothly.

"At first, the guys were a little more timid just because they hadn't worked with females on a day-to-day basis, but after a week they warmed up and were just like brothers and sisters fighting for the bathroom, to get in in the morning," Lt. Britta Christianson said then. "We're all sailors, if I'm on a surface ship or a submarine."

BONEFISH GRILL HOSTS LOCAL SUBVETS


Bonefish Grill in Cary, NC recently hosted Submarine Veterans from the USSVI Tarheel Base for lunch, who were proud to present pictures of the two USS Bonefish submarines, one being from WWII.

USS Bonefish (SS-223) was a Gato-class submarine, the first United States Navy ship to be named for the bonefish, which is a name for the ladyfish, dogfish, and sturgeon.

The Bonefish was the second to last submarine to be sank in WWII on June 18, 1945. All 85 crew members are fallen heroes. The lower picture on the Bonefish Grill flyer is the Bonefish returning to Sub Base Fremantle Australia at the end of its fourth War Patrol on May 30, 1944.

USS Bonefish (SS-582) was a Barbel-class submarine of the United States Navy, and was the second U.S. Navy submarine to be named for the bonefish, pictured below.





VETERAN DESIGNATION ON NC DRIVERS LICENSES

Hello Subvets, the implementation of a "TEMPORARY" Veterans designation for your Drivers License happened on this past Monday, 10/7/13. I stopped by one of the local Drivers License spots in Raleigh on Tuesday. Those folks didn't seem to know a whole lot about it and referred me to the main DMV office in downtown Raleigh. I stopped there today and was referred to a "Hearing Officer" who didn't know a whole lot about it but she took my name and cell number and said she would research it...I didn't hold a lot of hope. She proved me wrong as she called me a couple hours later...so here's what I found out....

If you go to renew or replace your current license, a "TEMPORARY" sticker will be placed on the back of the license. You must "REQUEST" the Vet designation and MUST prove you're a Vet by showing your DD214 and you must have been HONORABLY DISCHARGED. Bear in mind, you won't get your new or replacement license immediately, thus the "REQUEST." Remember DMV now mails your license to you which you should receive within 2 weeks of the time you submit your request for replacement or renewal. If you're only replacing your license, there's a \$10.00 fee. She didn't know if there's a fee for a renewal license...thought it was free...Imagine that. Didn't know what the PERMANENT Vet designation would look like and that won't be implemented until the Jan / Feb 2014 timeframe.

REMEMBER, DD214 is a MUST.
