LOST SUBMARINES - FIRST QUARTER

JANUARY

USS Scorpion (SS-278)

Lost sometime after January 5, 1944 with the loss of 76 men while on her 4th war patrol in the Yellow Sea off China due to unknown causes. It is assumed she was sunk by a mine.



USS Argonaut (SS-166)

Lost on January 10, 1943 with the loss of 102 men while on her 3rd war patrol southwest of New Britain. While attacking a convoy, she torpedoed a Japanese destroyer who along with two other destroyers depth charged her. As she tried to surface, the destroyers sunk her by gun fire.



USS Swordfish (SS-193)

Lost on January 12, 1945 with the loss of 89 men while on her 13th war patrol by a possible Japanese surface attack or mine somewhere near Okinawa.



USS S-36 (SS-141)

Lost on January 20, 1942 while on her 2nd war patrol when she ran aground on the Taka Bakang Reef in the Makassar Strait, east of Borneo and radioed for help. The entire crew was rescued by a Dutch launch boat after she was scuttled.



USS S-26 (SS-131)

Lost on January 24, 1942 with the loss of 46 men while on her 2^{nd} war patrol in the Gulf of Panama, 14 miles west of San Jose Light. She was rammed by the USS Sturdy (PC-460) and sunk within seconds. The CO, XO and one lookout on the bridge were the only survivors.



FEBRUARY

USS Barbel (SS-316)

Lost on February 4, 1945 with the loss of 81 men while on her 4th war patrol during a Japanese air attack near the southern entrance to the Palawan Passage.



USS Shark I (SS-174)

Lost on February 11, 1942 with the loss of 59 men on her 1st war patrol after receiving orders to proceed to Makassar Strait via the north coast of Celebes. Shark was the 1st US submarine sunk by enemy surface craft in the Pacific.



USS Amberjack (SS-219)

Lost on February 16, 1943 with the loss of 72 men while on her 3rd war patrol when she was attacked by a Japanese patrol plane and surface craft off Rabaul in the Solomon Sea.



USS Grayback (SS-208)

Lost on February 26, 1944 with the loss of 80 men while on her 10th war patrol when she was attacked by Japanese air and surface craft off Okinawa.



LOST SUBMARINES - FIRST QUARTER (cont.)

FEBRUARY (cont.)

USS Trout (SS-202)

Lost on February 29, 1944 with the loss of 81 men on her 11th war patrol during a Japanese surface attack southeast of Okinawa in the Philippine Sea.



MARCH

USS Perch (SS-176)

Lost on March 3, 1942 with no immediate loss of life while on her 1st war patrol. After two severe depth chargings in less than 200 feet of water by three Japanese destroyers, the crew abandoned ship and scuttled her. Of the 59 men taken prisoner, 6 men died as POWs, and 53 survived the war. Her wreckage has been located off the coast of Java.



USS Grampus (SS-207)

Lost on March 5, 1943 with the loss of 71 men while on her 6th war patrol. She was lost after engaging two Japanese Destroyers in Vella Gulf near the Solomon Islands.



USS H-1 (SS-28)

Lost on March 12, 1920 with the loss of 4 men as they tried to swim to shore after grounding on a shoal off Santa Margarita Island, off the coast of Baja California, Mexico. Vestal (AR-4) pulled her off the rocks on the morning of March 24th, only to have her sink 45 minutes later in some 50 feet of water.



USS Triton (SS-201)

Lost on March 15, 1943 with the loss of 74 men while on her 6th war patrol when she was sunk during a fight with three Japanese destroyers north of the Admiralty Islands, which are north of New Guinea.



USS Kete (SS-369)

Lost on March 20, 1945 with the loss of 87 men at the end of her 2nd war patrol between Okinawa and Midway, cause unknown. May have been sunk by a Japanese submarine that was subsequently lost.



USS F-4 (SS-23)

Lost on March 25, 1915 with the loss of 21 men after she foundered 1.5 miles off of Honolulu. Acid corrosion in the battery tank let seawater into the battery compartment, causing loss of control. F-4 was the first commissioned U.S. submarine to be lost at sea. She was raised in August 1915.



USS Tullibee (SS-284)

Lost on March 26, 1944 with the loss of 79 men while on her 4th war patrol. It's believed she was a victim of a circular run by one of her own torpedoes north of Palau. The lookout was the only survivor and he survived the war as a Japanese prisoner.



USS Trigger (SS-237)

Lost on March 28, 1945 with the loss of 89 men while on her 12th war patrol. She was lost during a combined attack by Japanese antisubmarine vessels and aircraft in the East China Sea.

Base members from 5 of the 6 USSVI Bases located in North Carolina were represented.

During the introductions, everyone cheered Everett Morgan's announcement that he and his wife Margaret had been married for 73 years.

Bill "Butterbean" Dixon, in his last official duty as Tarheel Base Commander, was the Master of Ceremonies and kept everyone well entertained. The SS Singers belted out an excellent selection of event appropriate songs.

A wooden silhouette of each boat lost was placed on the tables and the nearby candle was blown out when the associated boat was tolled, which you have to experience to truly appreciate.

JOSEPH LANGDELL, OLDEST USS ARIZONA SURVIVOR, DIES AT AGE 100

YUBA CITY, Calif. – The oldest living crew member of the USS Arizona to have survived the Japanese attack on Pearl Harbor has died in Northern California at the age of 100.

Retired Navy Lt. Commander Joseph Langdell died last Wednesday at a nursing home in Yuba City, California, according to his son, Ted Langdell. The USS Arizona Reunion Association said that as far as it knew Langdell was the last surviving officer from the naval battleship that lost 1,177 men when it was bombed on Dec. 7, 1941.

He was an ensign on an assignment that had him off the ship and on a nearby military base the morning Pearl Harbor was attacked. His son says Langdell spent the following days removing remains of the dead from the partially sunken ship.

The reunion association says there are now eight remaining survivors.



As a kid growing up in the exact geographical center of upstate New York, in the dairy farm country, the crocus would be the first blooming flower each year and after that some small flowers would blossom along the roadways and the pussy willows would again show themselves. I would always note, just before the expiration of winter (where our area always received 12 feet of snow), how soon all of the trees would begin to bud, and the streams would begin to swell with the spring melt.

We had an apple and pear orchard with red currants and blackberries, and each year we would put in a 1/4-acre of vegetable garden. We had experienced a terrific blizzard with high winds in December and as a result the oldest apple tree we had become split down the middle and each half lay on the ground 180 degrees apart. Dad said, "We're going to have to go out and cut up that tree for firewood, because apple tree wood is the absolute most efficient fuel for a wood burning stove or a fireplace." I told him that I would wait and take care of it in the upcoming springtime, so it was left to lie in wait. I knew that I would miss the pink and white blossoms that were such a pleasant harbinger of warmer weather to come. The middle of April arrived and the grass grew up around it and we didn't think any more about the loss after that. All of a sudden, I noticed that both sides of the tree were in blossom and the tree proved not to be completely done in yet. That tree might have been violently knocked down, but it was far from defeated. I came in and informed Dad to not count out the old apple tree yet. In the 1960s, Trini Lopez had a song called "Lemon Tree", and one of the lines was ... "take a lesson from the lovely lemon tree." In this instance, we can take a lesson from the old apple tree and keep it in our active memories for future use.

In, I Samuel 20:14 we learn, "And thou shalt not only while yet I live shew me the kindness of the LORD, that I die not." So just remember, Life and Death are in Your hands, LORD, and You are far kinder than we are. Every year, you give us Your springtime. Coming toward our beautiful springtime is almost as good as "making married man's turns for home" after a patrol.

Be well, my brothers, and may our GOD full of loving kindness bless you and your families.





Float Test	Testing the buoyant qualities of unwanted material. Such as cases of liver during a stores loading party. Akin to Deep-Six.
Rat Guards	Circular or conical metal plates attached to a ship's mooring lines with open end to the pier to prevent rats getting aboard.
Two-blocked	To reach the maximum limit of something. Can also mean just right, or perfect. The term originates in the use of block and tackle for hoisting. When the two blocks touch, lifting can proceed no farther.




Kenneth Leroy Sigworth, EM1(SS)

VETERANS' BURIAL PAYMENTS NOW AUTOMATED

WASHINGTON – New burial regulations will now allow the Department of Veterans Affairs (VA) to automatically pay the maximum amount allowable under law to most eligible surviving spouses more quickly and efficiently, without the need for a written application.

Under former regulations, VA paid burial benefits on a reimbursement basis, which required survivors to submit receipts for relatively small one-time payments that VA generally paid at the maximum amount permitted by law.

"VA is committed to improving the speed and ease of delivery of monetary burial benefits to veterans' survivors during their time of need," said Acting VA Secretary Sloan Gibson. "The recent changes allow VA to help these survivors bear the cost of funerals by changing regulations to get them the benefits more quickly."

This automation enables VA to pay a non-service-connected or service-connected burial allowance to an estimated 62,000 eligible surviving spouses out of a projected 140,000 claimants for burial benefits in 2014. Surviving spouses will be paid upon notice of the veteran's death using information already in VA systems. The burial allowance for a nonservice-connected death is \$300, and \$2,000 for a death connected to military service.

This revised regulation will further expedite the delivery of these benefits to surviving spouses, reduce the volume of claims requiring manual processing, and potentially make available resources for other activities that benefit veterans and their survivors.

"Oh Lord, my wife has fallen into the water!"


The Lord went down into the water and came up with Angelina Jolie. "Is this your wife?" the Lord asked. "Yup that's her," cried the Sailor.

US NAVY LOOKS AT NEXT GENERATION SSNX SUBMARINES AND 200 MILE RANGE TORPEDOES

The U.S. Navy is starting early preparation work to design a new nuclear attack submarine to replace the Virginia-class boats (SSN-774) in the 2030s. The new attack boat would become operational in 2044 after the last Block VII Virginias are built.

Nine years to identify, design and demonstrate the new technologies the new attack boat will need.

Johnson said that he has formed a small team to work on a fiveyear plan to begin to do some of that work. The team will consult with industry and will identify the threat environment and technologies the submarine will need to operate against in the 2050 plus timeframe, Johnson said.

One of the areas Johnson has already identified as critical for SSN(X) is integration with off-board systems. Vice Adm. Mike Connor, said that future submarine weapons for both the Virginia and the future SSN(X) would be networked extremely long-ranged weapons.

They will integrate with off-board systems so future Virginia boats and the SSN(X) can employ networked, extremely long-ranged weapons. A torpedo propulsion system concept from the Pennsylvania State University could allow a torpedo to hit a target 200 nmi (230 mi; 370 km) away and be guided by another asset during the terminal phase. Targeting information might also come from another platform like a patrol aircraft or an unmanned aerial vehicle (UAV) launched from the submarine.

E-PRESCRIBING - COMING SOON TO A MILITARY PHARMACY NEAR YOU!

The Military Health System has deployed electronic prescribing in military pharmacies across its system of clinics and hospitals in the United States (and in Guam and Puerto Rico). This capability will allow civilian providers to send prescriptions electronically to military pharmacies, reducing the need for handwritten prescriptions.

"E-prescribing is a great new service at military pharmacies," said Dr. George Jones, chief of the Defense Health Agency Pharmacy Operation Division. "E-prescribing makes military pharmacies a more attractive and convenient option for doctors and patients, and it aligns the Military Health System with current best pharmacy practices."

E-prescribing is a safe and efficient option already adopted by most civilian pharmacies and providers. It can help reduce prescription errors and has the potential to decrease wait times at military pharmacies. When a prescription comes into a pharmacy electronically, it allows the pharmacist to resolve issues before the patient arrives.

Beneficiaries can ask their doctor to look for their local military pharmacies in the e-prescribing database/networks. Military hospitals and clinics will not be able to accept electronic prescriptions for controlled substances. Beneficiaries will still need a hand written prescription for these medications.

PEARL HARBOR, Hawaii - The Los Angeles-class fast attack submarine USS Asheville (SSN 758) was presented the Meritorious Unit Commendation (MUC) by Rear Adm. Phil Sawyer, commander of Submarine Force, U.S. Pacific Fleet, Oct. 31, in a ceremony at the Pearl Harbor Naval Shipyard, for "displaying superb operational planning and tenacity" during the successful completion of a Western Pacific deployment.

According to the award citation from Chief of Naval Operations Adm. Jonathan Greenert, Asheville was recognized for meritorious service from April 2013 to September 2013, during which the ship completed two operations of great importance to national security and three theater anti-submarine warfare operations in support of fleet objectives.

They are currently conducting an extended engineering maintenance period at the Pearl Harbor Naval Shipyard, and expect to return to southern California after completion of sea trials.
