LOST SUBMARINES - FIRST QUARTER

JANUARY

USS Scorpion (SS-278)

Lost on January 5, 1944 with the loss of 77 officers and men in the East China Sea, on her 4th war patrol. It is assumed she was sunk by a mine.



USS Argonaut (SS-166)

Lost on January 10, 1943 with the loss of 105 officers and men off Rabaul, on her 3rd war patrol. While attacking a convoy, she torpedoed a Japanese destroyer who along with 2 other destroyers depth charged her. As she tried to surface, the destroyers sunk her by gun fire.



USS Swordfish (SS-193)

Lost on January 12, 1945 with the loss of 83 officers and men somewhere near Okinawa, on her 13th war patrol. Probably was lost to a mine.



USS S-36 (SS-141)

Lost on January 20, 1942 with no loss of life on her 2nd war patrol. She ran hard aground on a reef and radioed for help. The entire crew was rescued by a Dutch ship after they scuttled her.



USS S-26 (SS-131)

Lost on January 24, 1942 with the loss of 46 officers and men in the Gulf of Panama, on her 2nd war patrol. She was rammed by the USS Sturdy (PC-460) and sunk within seconds. The CO, XO and one lookout on the bridge, were the only survivors.



FEBRUARY

USS Barbel (SS-316)

Lost on February 4, 1945 with the loss of 81 officers and men on her 3rd war patrol. Based on Japanese records, she was bombed near the southern entrance to the Palawan Passage. The day before, she reported she survived 3 depth charge attacks.



USS Shark I (SS-174)

Lost on February 11, 1942 with the loss of 59 officers and men on her 1st war patrol. Shark was the 1st US submarine sunk by enemy surface craft in the Pacific. She was most likely sunk by depth charges.



USS Amberjack (SS-219)

Lost on February 16, 1943 with the loss of 72 officers and men on her 3rd war patrol. Off Rabaul, she was attacked by a Japanese patrol plane, attacked by a torpedo boat and then depth charged by a subchaser.



USS Grayback (SS-208)

Lost on February 27, 1944 with the loss of 80 officers and men on her 10th war patrol. She appears to have been caught on the surface in the East China Sea by a Japanese carrier plane whose bombs made a direct hit. During this patrol she sank 4 ships totaling 21,594 tons and was tied for 11th in the number of ships sunk.



LOST SUBMARINES - FIRST QUARTER (cont.)

FEBRUARY (cont.)

USS Trout (SS-202)

Lost on February 29, 1944 with the loss of 79 officers and men on her 11th war patrol. She was sunk by escorts in the middle of the Philippines Basin after sinking a passenger-cargoman and damaging another in a convoy. She carried out several notable special missions, including carrying over two tons of gold bullion out of Corregidor in February 1942.



MARCH

USS Perch (SS-176)

Lost on March 3, 1942 near Java with no immediate loss of life, while on her 1st war patrol. She survived 2 severe depth chargings in less than 200 feet of water by 3 Japanese destroyers. The crew abandoned ship and scuttled her. Of the 61 officers and men taken prisoner, 53 survived the war.



USS Grampus (SS-207)

Lost on March 5, 1943 with the loss of 72 officers and men, on her 6th war patrol. She was lost in Vella Gulf, sunk after engaging 2 Japanese Destroyers.



USS H-1 (SS-28)

Lost on March 12, 1920 with the loss of 4 men as they tried to swim to after grounding on a shoal off Santa Margarita Island, off the coast of Baja California, Mexico. Vestal (AR-4) pulled H-1 off the rocks in the morning of 24 March, only to have her sink 45 minutes later in some 50 feet of water. She was originally named the USS Seawolf before becoming H-1.



USS Triton (SS-201)

Lost on March 15, 1943 with the loss of 74 men. She was sunk north of the Admiralty Islands during a fight with 3 Japanese Destroyers. Triton was the 1st boat to engage the enemy in December 1941 off Wake Island, sinking 9 ships, 1 submarine and a destroyer.



USS Kete (SS-369)

Lost on March 20, 1945 with the loss of 87 officers and men at the end of her 2nd war patrol. Probably sunk near Okinawa, by a Japanese submarine that itself was subsequently lost.



USS F-4 (SS-23)

Lost on March 25, 1915 with the loss of 21 men. She foundered 1.5 miles off of Honolulu when acid corrosion of the lead lining of the battery tank let seawater into the battery compartment, causing loss of control. F-4 was the first commissioned submarine of the U.S. Navy to be lost at sea. She was raised in August 1915.



USS Tullibee (SS-284)

Lost on March 26, 1944 with the loss of 79 officers and men, on her 4th war patrol. It's believed she was a victim of a circular run by one of her own torpedoes. The lookout was the only survivor and he survived the war as a Japanese prisoner.



USS Trigger (SS-237)

Lost on March 26, 1945 with the loss of 91 officers and men, on her 12th war patrol. She was lost during a combined attack by Japanese antisubmarine vessels and aircraft. Trigger ranked 7th in total tonnage sunk and tied for 8th in number of ships sunk.

PEARL HARBOR REMEMBRANCE DINNER

On Saturday, December 8th, the annual Pearl Harbor Remembrance Dinner was held at the Village Inn located in Clemmons. NC and was hosted by the Nat Greene Base for the first time. The last time the Pearl Harbor Remembrance Dinner was held there was in 2002. Overall, the Inn did work with us to have the noise from the adjacent banquet room minimized during "Tolling the Boats," which was the main reason we stopped using this location for the dinner after 2002.

Actual attendance at this year's dinner was 77, which included the guest speaker Capt. Pete Graef and his wife Carol, as well as Pat Collin's daughter and granddaughter. Base members from 4 of the 6 USSVI Bases located in North Carolina were represented. WWII Subvets George Bass, Joe Clark, Charles Stevenson, and Bill Whelan were also in attendance and Capt. Graef mentioned the boats that George, Joe, Charles, and Bill served on during WWII as part of his remarks, as well as his experience as the last Commanding Officer of the USS Parche SSN 683. Parche is the most decorated ship in U.S. Navy history, receiving a total of nine Presidential Unit Citations and ten Navy Unit Commendations. The submarine also received thirteen Navy Expeditionary Medals during her thirty years of service.

Hoppy Hopkins and George Base did the POW/MIA table ceremony and added to the traditional "Tolling the Boats" was Hoppy playing Taps after all of the boats had been tolled.

Fred Gunter and his wife Jennette did an outstanding job hosting the hospitality room with plenty of snacks always available. Ray Moore headed setting up the table decorations including the submarine silhouettes used for the "Tolling the Boats" as well as developing and printing the dinner's program. Mike Runkle handled the sale of 50/50 raffle tickets as well as collecting bids for the silent auction. Mike Burkholder and his wife Mariann were able to attend this year allowing Mike to once again provide the questionable history of many of the door prizes (most of which were re-gifted items) as he used to do when he headed up the dinner each year before moving to Fort Wayne.

Joe Schmidt from the USS Asheville Base donated a hand carved set of dolphins that he carved out of black walnut for a silent auction with the proceeds going to a new maintenance fund for Joshua's Angel Center. Jim Myers' daughter Rene Armstrong won the auction with a bid of \$200.00 and gave the dolphins to Jim as a Christmas Present. SUBVETS GROTON BASE - USS THRESHER MEMORIAL PROJECT

From John Carcioppolo, Groton Base Commander

Shipmates.

This subject is important, so I wanted to only send this only subject in this broadcast.

Kevin Galeaz is a dual member of Groton Base. He is the Base Commander of THRESHER Base to the north of Groton.

I have known Kevin and his wife Robin for a good number of years. He is a hard working young man and he is very dedicated to "perpetuating the memory". In particular to perpetuating the memory of our Shipmates lost on USS THRESHER. He is very focused, committed and engaged with anything to do with remembering THRESHER.

Kevin has taken on this extremely important project to gain approval to place a commemorative memorial for those Shipmates lost on THRESHER at Arlington National Cemetery. He has an uphill fight on his hands, and he needs the support of everyone in this organization and many more to have his back in this fight.

The unfortunate loss of those men onboard THRESHER on 10 April 1963 was the spark necessary to start our organization U.S. SUBMARINE VETERANS Inc. as a separate organization from the U.S. SUBMARINE VETERANS WWII. It was their tragedy that was needed to establish our organization committed to perpetuate the memory of ALL U.S. Submariners. It was their sacrifice that laid the groundwork for an organization of camaraderie for all Submariners who served before, during and after WWII that we enjoy today.

As we all know THRESHERs loss, and the loss of her crew also set in stone the foundation for the Submarine QA Program as we know it today. There is no way of knowing how the sacrifice of the crew of THRESHER helped save so many other lives in our Submarine Force today with the stringent controls of QA that were not in place before their loss.

USS THRESHER MEMORIAL PROJECT (cont.)

So I am totally behind Kevin's efforts to establish this memorial at Arlington to the crew of THRESHER and I'm asking you to join me. I firmly believe that as Submariners, and as members of USSVI all of us should get behind Kevin's cause because we owe it to those 129 souls who gave their lives for us.

Last night I spoke with Kevin and I committed the support of the Membership of Groton Base. I hope that you will take the little bit of time required to read the below description of this project, and then follow through and send the letter that he is requesting showing your support. There is no cost other than the cost of a stamp and an envelope and a small bit of your time. Then follow up with the email to let Kevin know you supported his position.

Back in 1998 and 1999 the USPS told the Submarine Force no with regards to a stamp commemorating the 100th Anniversary of the U.S. Submarine Force. Submarine Veterans like you and I and many others outside our organization took the time to be part of a massive letter writing campaign, and we had our stamps. This worthwhile project is no different, except it is more significant and important. If we all do our part perhaps we will have an influence and this will be reality and a true tribute to our Shipmates. We have nothing to lose by trying.

This year on April 10th, marks the 50th anniversary of the loss of the USS Thresher (SSN 593) with 119 sailors and civilians aboard.

A Special Ceremony of Remembrance will be held on Saturday, 6 April, at 1300 hours at the Portsmouth Naval Shipyard where the Thresher was built.

Adm Richardson, Head of Naval Reactors, will be in attendance as will almost 1,000 other guests. You are also invited to attend.

If anyone in your Base, as a submarine veteran would like to attend in person, we need their full info by email before 1 March so all the tickets and other security details can be taken care of.

If you can't make it to Kittery, Maine, this Special Ceremony will be broadcast live via the DOD Video Department, on the Internet for all to share.

So we are asking you to take 3 actions before this ceremony:

- 1. Take a picture or a video of your Base and submit it along with an appropriate Memorial Statement to thresherbase@comcast.net before 1 March. These will be collated and shown to all the ceremony participants as a streamed video before the ceremony begins.
- 2. Invite your Base to watch this ceremony together, as it has such significance for all of us who steamed under the sea. You can get a large monitor or several and just join the ceremony at a URL which will be provided before the event.
- 3. If there are any Thresher family members who might live in your area, and they cannot attend the actual ceremony, we are asking that your Base provide a loaner PC to them with help so they can watch the ceremony live.

Your Memorial Statement along with the picture or video from your Base will provide evidence of the continuity that all Brothers of the Phin are part of.

USSVI MEMBERSHIP INFORMATION

ELIGIBILITY: To have served and qualified on a United States Submarine

MEMBERSHIP RULES: Dues are due by December 31st of each year for National and Base.

BASE ANNUAL DUES: \$15 (nominally, contact your base treasurer for more information)

NATIONAL DUES: Non-Life Member dues are 5 Years = \$90, 3 Years = \$55, or 1 Year = \$20

Life Membership varies with age: Up to 45 years old = \$500, 46-55 = \$400,

56-65 = \$300, 66-75 = \$200, 76 and up = \\$100

CHAPLAIN'S CORNER

Hearty greetings shipmates, from under the glorious blue skies of Carolina. The chilly air early each morning, as my fourteen-year-old Black Lab, Missy, let's me accompany her on her first walk of the day, works to remind me of things to come. Spring is my most treasured time of every year. It is the world waking up to a new season. The trees bud out and greenery begins again, after a long hiatus over the months of scolding winter, and all things are renewed. I forecast that our world will come to a new revival of God's Word especially when we are in most need of working together and becoming better people in His blessed name. You may say, "What is there to look forward to in a world so corrupt and back-sliding?" I say look to your Bible! My favorite acronym for the most popular book in all of worldly history translates as "Basic Instructions Before Leaving Earth." There is more wisdom and pure path-of-life meaning in that book and most of it is written by authors who had a personal physical connection with our Lord.

Last autumn, having once been an avid camper. I once again yearned to sit by a campfire, even if it had to be in my own backyard. I pondered the possibilities and formulated a plan to build a fire-pit for getting rid of all the dead branches and blow-downs in my woods nearby, and being able to enjoy sitting by the fire while a soft glow warmed the evening hours. It was hard digging in this clay-based soil here, but I persevered and today I have a great area for personal and friendly communing with nature amongst friends and family. My neighbor, Paul, loaned me his electric chain saw and now I was in business. Presently there are enough stumps to sit on for a dozen or more people. Since the successful installation, honest physical exercise has begat many hours of relaxation in the simple act of sitting by the campfire. Come on over and enjoy it with me sometime, your invitation is open.

Watching the fire work its way around and through the limb wood is anathema for this crazy world and soothing the pains of Satan's daily whippings. It is the best place that I have for prayer and talking with Jesus. His Word is the same now as it was when he came to Earth and his promise is ever held out to each and every one of us. We have not, because we ask not. Be specific and earnest in your prayer and supplication to the Lord. If you don't then you had better have good Fire Insurance. God doesn't expect us to make promises we cannot keep, but He does expect us to have faith that He has made promises only He can keep."

I close with this prayer for all those who serve, as well as our veterans and retirees:

CRIBBAGE TRIVIA FOR SUBMARINERS

Cribbage has been popular with mariners for hundreds of years, enjoying especially widespread play in the Navy during World War II. It was thought of as the unofficial game of submariners, who played round the clock as they patrolled for Japanese ships.

The most famous incident related to cribbage in the Navy occurred in 1943 aboard one of the war's most celebrated submarines, the USS Wahoo. For the Wahoo's fourth war patrol, it was ordered to head to the extreme northern reaches of the Yellow Sea, an area where no sub had gone before. The waters near the Dairen Peninsula were shallow, and crewmembers grew nervous as they glided into dangerous territory. To take their minds off the tension, the sub's commander, Dudley "Mush" Morton and his executive officer, Richaed "Dick" O'Kane, began a game of cribbage. Morton dealt O'Kane a "Perfect 29" hand - four fives and a

jack - the highest possible score for combinations in a single cribbage deal. Back-of-the-envelope calculations were done, and 216,000 to 1 were the odds thrown out as to the chances of that happening. The crew's spirits were bolstered by what they felt was a very lucky omen. O'Kane had his fellow officers sign the five cards and he framed them.

Rear Admiral Richard Hetherington "Dick" O'Kane. O'Kane has the distinction of directly participating in more successful attacks on Japanese shipping than any other fighting submarine officer during the war.

Good fortune did prevail on the patrol - at its end the Wahoo had set a record for the number of ships sunk. It continued for O'Kane too. When he was detached from the Wahoo and given command of the Tang, that sub broke the former's record for most ships sunk in a single patrol. And while he was captured by the Japanese when the Tang was sunk by an errant torpedo that circled back and hit it, O'Kane survived the war, and was awarded the Medal of Honor for his "conspicuous gallantry and intrepidity" during his submarine's final operations.



O'Kane's lucky cribbage board has become an important submariner tradition; since WWII it has been passed along to the oldest active submarine in the United States Pacific Fleet. Once the sub is decommissioned, it is given to the next oldest submarine, where it is placed in the wardroom.

The famous crib board currently resides aboard the USS Bremerton SSN698, which launched in 1978.

Base Commanders, the 1962 Cuban Missile Crisis was the closest the world ever came to nuclear war. The United States armed forces were at their highest state of readiness ever and Soviet field commanders in Cuba were prepared to use battlefield nuclear weapons to defend the island if it was invaded.

On October 22, President Kennedy announced the discovery of the missile installations to the public and his decision to quarantine the island. He also proclaimed that any nuclear missile launched from Cuba would be regarded as an attack on the United States by the Soviet Union and demanded that the Soviets remove all of their offensive weapons from Cuba.

It would be an interesting historical discussion for your base meeting to have members discuss where they were and what they were doing during this very dangerous period during the cold war.

The Large Displacement Unmanned Underwater Vehicle (LDUUV) will be large and highly autonomous, carrying out missions at long distances for months. It will act as a mothership, deploying and operating static and mobile sensors for persistent surveillance in coastal waters. Ultimately, it is likely to be armed.

GROTON, Conn. (AP) — U.S. Navy officials are recognizing U.S. Sen. Joe Lieberman's support by naming him an "honorary submariner."

Lieberman, an independent, has been a U.S. senator since 1989 and is a member of the Senate Armed Services Committee. He is retiring at the end of this session rather than seeking re-election.

He was an active member of the Tarheel Chapter of U.S. Submarine Veterans of World War II from 1993 until the chapter gave up its charter, and was also a member of the Tarheel Base of U.S. Submarine Veterans, Inc.

Billy saw service during World War II aboard USS SEA POACHER (SS-406) and USS SEA FOX (SS-402) as a radioman.

Four Tarheel Base members were part a well-attended tribute to Billy Williams on 27 December 2012 at Edgewood Free Will Baptist Church in Crisp, NC. 
