

There are no minutes for December since that was only a Dinner meeting with VFW Post 9138.



His first wife was his Navy wife and holds a special place and is the mother of Ron's two children, now in their forties. Ron grew up in eastern Stanley County near Albemarle, NC. After high school. Ron's father took Ron to the local cotton mill and found Ron a job. Ron worked in the cotton mill for about two years before deciding that was not the life he wanted and decided to join the Navy in 1960.

Ron must have performed well on the entrance exams, for he was selected for ET school after boot camp. While in "A School", Ron heard of the Nuke 9901 program and again was qualified. He also chose submarines for

Ron was now off to the USS Von Steuben SSBN632, new construction in Newport News. But first leave to marry Peggy, Ron's first wife and the mother of his two children. Ron finished the construction, shake-down, missile shot, and several

patrols. During his next to last patrol he received a family gram stating that his son had been born. He had missed the birth. That did not set well with Ron or his wife. They discussed the facts. Ron decided he would stay in the Navy if he could get shore duty after his next patrol. When he could not, he and his wife decided it was time to get out. Ron wanted to go to college and get a degree. Ron did just that. He attended college and obtained a degree in Business Administration. During his last year he heard someone talking about the credits one could get for their military service. This interested Ron and he traced this information down. After applying, with all of the nuclear and other navy schools, Ron had more than enough credits to now graduate. Ron found a job as a salesman for a outdoor advertising firm. Later Ron, would sell advertising time for three different radio stations in Charlotte. Ron is now retired and travels with wife when they can, since Diane is a tax consultant and still enjoys working.

### **Sweet & Sour Peanut Sauce**

Use this sauce to dress noodles or vegetables. This amount is enough for coating 1 pound of spaghetti, linguine, or fettuccine.

2 cloves garlic, peeled

1/2 cup smooth peanut butter

2/3 cup cilantro

2 tablespoons rice vinegar or cider vinegar

1 tablespoon plus 1 teaspoon reduced-sodium soy sauce

2 teaspoons honey

3/4 teaspoon hot pepper sauce

1/4 teaspoon salt

In small saucepan of boiling water, cook garlic about 2 minutes to blanch. Drain. Transfer garlic to blender or food processor. Add peanut butter, cilantro, vinegar, soy sauce, honey, hot sauce, salt, and 1/2 cup of water and process until smooth.

### Your Veteran News From the RAQ Bulletin

Obit | Rodolfo P. Hernandez ► 21 Dec 2013 **Editor's Note: Rudy** was a member of the Carolina Piedmont Base. If you were at the Burnsville event, the last year we were in Spruce Pine at the "old schoolhouse", then you may have met Rudy that year. I believe it was 2010. - Moe(SS) Army veteran Rodolfo P. Hernandez, 81, who earned the Medal of Honor for heroic actions while stationed with G Company, 187th Airborne Regimental Combat Team near Wontongne, Korea, May 31, 1951, died Dec. 21 in Fayetteville, N.C. The son of a migrant working family in rural California.. Rodolfo "Rudy" Hernandez enlisted in the U.S. Army at age 17 and was stationed in Germany before being sent into battle, where 54.200 American Soldiers perished in the Korean War. Hernandez

among the first to be sent to battle on Hill 420

and his platoon were

His 11th and final airborne operation involved Hernandez jumping from just 600 feet above ground, into the enemy's lair behind the North Korean capital. "We jumped into the enemy ... Before the jump I felt like John Wayne," Hernandez reported in a 2004 interview to The Point, a U.S. Army newspaper in Germany. "By the time my chute opened, I was already on the ground," Hernandez said. "The first round that went over my head was artillery. Afterward I felt this big," he said, holding his fingers about an inch apart. "I knew they meant business." But hope seemed to diminish along with the beleaguered platoon's ammunition, as enemy fire -- mortars, heavy artillery and machine gun bullets -- rained on the soldiers, causing multiple casualties. According to Hernandez' Medal of Honor citation, he and his comrades were forced to withdraw.

but, wounded in an exchange of grenades, he continued to deliver deadly fire into the ranks of his onrushing assailants until a ruptured cartridge rendered his rifle inoperative.

With a head wound and a jammed rifle. Hernandez scrambled to put his bayonet in his rifle and bounded toward the enemy. His charge stymied their advance and enabled his platoon to regain the lost ground. Hernandez killed six enemy troops before losing consciousness after a grenade exploded near his head and blew off part of his skull. Thirty days later, he would awaken in a military hospital temporarily unable to speak or use his arms and legs. In a White House ceremony, President Harry S Truman presented Hernandez the highest military decoration for combat heroism on April 12, 1952. Hernandez spent his post-war years working for Department of Veterans Affairs, retiring in 1980. He is survived by his wife and three children from a previous marriage. ## Holiday Blues ► 10 to 30M Americans Suffer Mild Depression

The holiday season offers plenty of opportunities for joy, but for some, the hustle and bustle of the season isn't cause for celebration. For many, it's a source of loneliness, sadness and grief. Just ask Dr. Ron Pekala, biofeedback director and coordinator for research and development at the Coatesville VA Medical Center in Pennsylvania. "People who are prone to depression or have had trauma have expectations about the holidays," says Pekala. "They think things should be a certain way and when they're not, it affects them." Pekala is concerned about how the holiday blues affect his patients. Studies have shown some 10 to 30 million Americans suffer from at least mild symptoms of depression during the holiday season. What sets Pekala apart is that he's not just focusing on depression. Rather, he's interested in helping his patients find happiness. "People can become less depressed but still not be happy. There are two sides at play here—positive and negative. These emotions come from different parts of the brain," says Pekala. "Maybe you don't have family around during the holidays. We all have tragedies in our lives, but that doesn't mean you can't find happiness." If you understand happiness and what it takes to be happy, says Pekala, then you can load the dice in your favor. The development of achievable goals can lead to feelings of... increased self-esteem. Quiet time...a remedy for the holiday blues. It all starts with social interaction, which is what the holidays are about. says Pekala. Relatives from across the country get together and reminisce. Long lost cousins, neighbors and coworkers gather at parties. People talk. They laugh. That laughter generates endorphin release and a feeling of well-being. All these things make a difference in developing happiness and increasing self-esteem, according to Pekala. "It's science," he says. Pekala warns not to

parties though. Science

also supports quiet time

as a remedy for the holi-

day blues. We live in a

frenetic culture, particu-

larly so during the holi-

days. There's shopping

to do, miles to travel and

turkeys to cook. It's fight

or flight most of the time and this leads to exhaustion. Again, science plays a role. The body's parasympathetic nerve system works to calm you down. Sit down and read a book, take a walk, or listen to music and let the world wait a while. And, though it might not fit the image of pecan pies and egg nog, there is always good old aerobic exercise if you want to get a jump on your New Year's resolution. Studies suggest exercise is as effective as Prozac or other anti-depressants on mild-depression. A short stint of cardiovascular stimulation will leave you feeling positive after you cool down. Research has shown that aerobic exercise can lead to new neuron growth, effectively allowing you to remodel your brain with each step on the treadmill. Just make sure you keep the routine up for at least 90 days. Research has shown habits tend to stick better after three consecutive months.

Have something positive to look forward to. Along with helping your mind and your body, a good exercise program can also provide feelings of success and achievement. The development of achievable goals, not just in the gym, but in all walks of life, can lead to feelings of success, competence and increased self-

esteem. Whatever you do to stay happy, the important thing is to have something positive to look forward to every day. "We need hope," says Pekala. "We need positive events to look forward to and that means finding ways to make yourself happy. Developing such positive expectations and perceptions are very important in cultivating happiness and reducing depression." Pekala asks: "Are you going to change the world or are you going to change your perception of the world? Which is easier?"

An Overview of the PET Scan. PET scan or Positron Emission Tomography is a modern medical equipment that helps monitor the human body system functions and any unnecessary development can be detected to the minutest detail. The working of the PET scan is similar to that of the Computer Tomography (CT) and Magnetic Resonance Imaging (MRI) scan. The history of this diagnostic test can be traced back to the 1950s when two scientists Roy Edwards and David E. Kuhl introduced the idea of using emission and transmission tomography for imaging purposes. This concept was further improved and developed by a group of scientists of the Washington School of Medicine and a fullfledged PET scan came into existence. The images captured can be viewed on a computer monitor, with the help of which the radiologist can study the working of the body. This equipment has proved to be a boon to the field of medicine. The cost of this test may vary from state to state and the nature of complaint for which the scan is to be taken. However, on an average a scan can cost anywhere between \$3,000 - \$6,000.

Method and Preparation. The working of the PET scan is not exactly rocket science and is quite simple to understand. Undergoing this scan is painless and causes no discomfort to the individual. However, the preparation for the scan takes a longer time than the actual procedure. Before the actual process, the individual has to undergo a CT scan. The process is carried out under the outpatient department and the duration may depend on the region of the body to be examined. The duration of a full body scan may last approximately for about 2 to 3 hours. Here are some guidelines on how to prepare for the scan.

Before undergoing the scan, the individual may be told to follow some directions regarding the test. The test is usually carried out on an empty stomach.

Water may be consumed by the individual. The person should not wear dentures, any jewelry or metal objects as it may prove to be a hindrance and produce vague results.

The individual is told to wear a hospital gown and is made to lie on the scanner table. A radioactive chemical, radiopharmaceutical, is injected into the body. This substance takes about one hour to travel across the body.

Sometimes the person may be told to drink a contrast liquid to get a clear imaging. Once the substance has spread, the table is rolled into the scanner machine,

where the process of imaging stars.

The radioactive element lets out rays which are captured by the camera and transmitted to a computer fitted to the machine. The technician monitors the images and the presence of any disorder can be revealed in places where a bright spot appears on the screen.

☐ This scan helps detect the functioning of the brain and other organs, blood circulation and also reveal the presence of tumors or cysts. Patients suffering diabetes, heart disorders or who are on prescription drugs should consult the health care provider before undergoing PET scan and radiology. Pregnant women and lactating mothers should not undergo this scan, since radiation can harm the child.

Advancement in technology and medicine has helped doctors across the world to delve deeper into the human body and detect the presence of any abnormal changes, so that appromal changes,

### Lost Boats— USS Swordfish SS-193



USS Swordfish (SS-193), a Sargo-class submarine, was the first submarine of the United States Navy named for the swordfish, a large fish with a long, sword-like beak and a high dorsal fin. She was the first United States Navy submarine to sink a Japanese ship during World War II.

Her keel was laid down on 27 October 1937 by the Mare Island Naval Shipyard of Vallejo, California. She was launched on 3 April 1939 sponsored by Miss Louise Shaw Hepburn, and commissioned on 22 July 1939 with Lieutenant Chester C. Smith in command.

Following shakedown and post-shakedown repairs at Mare Island, *Swordfish* operated out of San Diego, California, until early 1941, when she set sail for Pearl Harbor. On 3 November, *Swordfish*, in company with three other U.S. submarines, departed Pearl, and on 22 November, arrived at Manila, Philippine Islands. The submarine remained at Manila until the Japanese attack on

Pearl Harbor on 7 December 1941. The following day, she set sail on her first war patrol, conducted off the coast of Hainan, China. After damaging several enemy vessels on the 9th, 11th, and 14th, Swordfish sank her initial victim of the war on 16 December. Hit amidships by one of three torpedoes, the cargo ship Atsutasan Maru erupted in a cloud of smoke and flames and disappeared beneath the waves. On 27 December, Swordfish embarked the organizational staff of the Submarine Asiatic Command Staff at Manila and headed for Soerabaja, Java, arriving on 7 January 1942. Swordfish departed Soerabaja on 16 January for her second war patrol, conducted in the Celebes Sea and in the Philippines. On 24 January, she torpedoed and sank a cargo ship off Kema, Celebes Islands. On 20 February, she submerged in the entrance of Mariveles, Luzon, only to surface after dark to take on board the President of the Philippines, his family and select high-ranking officers. She departed on the surface about 11:30pm and sailed

through a minefield. She submerged during the day of 21 February, between 6:20am and 6:20pm which caused it to be quite warm, 94F and 92% humidity. She arrived off the coast of San Jose, Panay, Philippine Islands on 22 February at 10pm and they stopped at 2:30am on 23 February about a mile off the coast of San Jose de Buenavista, Antique. Fifteen minutes later they were advised that their launch was approaching. The passengers debarked the sub around 3am on 23 February. The President and his party were transferred to a motor tender. Swordfish then returned to Manila Bay and embarked the High Commissioner of the Philippines, arriving Fremantle, Western Australia, on 9 March. Swordfish got underway from Fremantle on 1 April for her third war patrol, with her primary mission being to deliver 40 tons of provisions to the besieged island of Corregidor. However, Corregidor fell to the Japanese before the mission could be carried out and the submarine was ordered to patrol in the

vicinity of Ambon Is-

land. The only ships sighted were beyond effective range, and the submarine returned to Fremantle on 1 May. Departing Fremantle for her fourth war patrol on 15 May. Swordfish was in the South China Sea on 29 May where she sank a 1900-ton cargo ship and was in the Gulf of Siam on 12 June where she torpedoed and sank another cargo ship. The submarine returned to Fremantle on 4 July. Although her fifth war patrol, conducted in the Sulu Sea, and her sixth war patrol, conducted in the Solomon Islands. were unproductive, during her seventh war patrol Swordfish sank a 4122-ton cargo ship on 19 January 1943. Returning to Pearl Harbor on 23 February, the submarine underwent overhaul until 29 July, when she got underway for her eighth war patrol. On 22 August, she sighted her first target of the patrol, and quickly sent the cargo ship to the bottom, the victim of two torpedo hits. A convoy was intercepted on 5 September, and Swordfish damaged a large tanker before sinking a cargo ship. The submarine concluded this pa-

trol at Brisbane, Australia, on 20 September. Swordfish's ninth war patrol lasted only three weeks. Shortly after reaching her assigned patrol area, material defects were discovered, and the submarine had to return to port. On the day after Christmas 1943, Swordfish de-

and the submarine had to mas 1943, Swordfish departed for her tenth war patrol, in the hands of one of the Submarine Force's oldest commanders, 42-year-old Karl G. Hensel (Class of 1923), formerly commanding Submarine Division 101. The patrol was conducted in Tokyo Bay. It was plagued with equipment casualties in old Swordfish, including radar trouble and electrical fires. On 13 January 1944, she sank 6,921 ton freighter Yamakuni *Maru*, while surviving "heavy—and close depth charges". The depth charging caused her to lose power in her electrical systems, and when she dived at dawn the next day, she suffered two separate fires and nearly went right to the bottom; her captain managed to bring her back up, where she wallowed on the surface, only to have a Japanese patrol boat close on her. She regained power in the nick of time and

dived. At around 2200 on 14 January, Swordfish detected another ship, and made radar contact at 7nmi on the Japanese navy's first genuine Qship, the 2,182 ton merchantman Delhi Maru, on her maiden voyage. She had been outfitted with sonar (which Swordfish had heard pinging), new watertight bulkheads, depth charge throwers. and concealed guns, specially to destroy submarines. At midnight, Swordfish fired three bow torpedo tubes, scoring three hits with the recently corrected Mark XIV torpedo. Delhi Maru blew up, and the two patrol boats of her escort kept Swordfish down with depth charges for three hours before she evaded

17 January, Swordfish was detailed to intercept Shōkaku and her escort. In the dark, it was impossible to see the carrier, but radar made contact on the force at 16,000 yards, making 27kn. To avoid being detected, Swordfish dived, only to end up 2,000 yards in front of one of Shokaku's escorting destroyers, which practically ran right over her. Shokaku came on so fast, Swordfish could barely get off a shot from her four stern tubes, with the carrier going away;

all missed. On 27 January, *Swordfish* fired two torpedoes at a converted salvage vessel which broke in half and sank. She completed her tenth patrol at Pearl Harbor on 7 February. Her total score was claimed to be two ships for 15,200 tons; this was reduced by JANAC to 12,543 tons postwar, but raised to three ships. *Swordfish* put to sea on

13 March for her elev-

enth war patrol, con-

ducted in the Mariana

Islands. Although sev-

eral enemy ships were damaged during this patrol, no sinkings could be confirmed; and the submarine returned to Majuro on 29 April. Swordfish's twelfth war patrol was conducted in the area of the Bonin Islands. On 9 June, the submarine found Japanese destroyer Matsukaze clearly illuminated against the horizon and sank the enemy ship with two torpedoes from her bow tubes. On 15 June, she torpedoed and sank a cargo ship. The remainder of the patrol was unproductive, and the submarine terminated her twelfth patrol at Pearl Harbor on 30 June. On 22 December, Swordfish departed Pearl Harbor to conduct her thirteenth war patrol, in the

vicinity of Nansei Shoto. She topped off with fuel at Midway on 26 December and left that day for her area. In addition to her regular patrol, *Sword-fish* was to conduct photographic reconnaissance of Okinawa, for preparation of the Okinawa Campaign.

On 2 January, Swordfish was ordered to delay carrying out her assigned tasks in order to keep her clear of the Nansei Shoto area until completion of carrier-based air strikes which were scheduled. She was directed to patrol the general vicinity of 30°N: 132°E until further orders were received. Her acknowledgement of those orders on 3 January was the last communication received from Swordfish. On 9 January 1945,


Swordfish was directed to proceed to the vicinity of Okinawa to carry out her special mission. It was estimated that the task would not take more than seven days after arrival on station, which she should have reached on 11 January. Upon completion of her mission, Swordfish was to proceed to Saipan, or to Midway if she was unable to transmit by radio. Since neither place had seen her by 15 February, and repeated attempts to raise

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her by radio had failed, she was reported as presumed lost on that date. In the report of her loss, mention was made that Kete (SS-369), which at the time was patrolling the vicinity of Okinawa, reported that on the morning of 12 January she contacted a submarine by radar. It was believed that contact was with Swordfish. Four hours later Kete heard heavy depth charging from this area, and it was believed that this attack might have been the cause of Swordfish's loss.

Japanese information on antisubmarine attacks does not mention the attack heard by *Kete* on 12 January, and records no attacks in which *Sword-fish* is likely to have been the victim. However, it is now known that there were many mines planted around Okinawa, since the Japanese were expecting an

Allied invasion of that island. The majority of the mines were planted close in. It is considered about equally likely that Swordfish was sunk by depth charge attack before she reached Okinawa for her special mission or that she was lost to a mine at that place. Swordfish earned eight battle stars for World War II service. A memorial to the boat has been erected in St. Paul. Minnesota near the Como Park Zoo and Conservatory. It is just off Churchill Street, on a rise a short walk south of Hamm Falls. This consists of a torpedo on a stand. On one side of the base is a plaque listing the names of the crew and giving a brief history of the vessel. On the other is a roll of U.S. submarines lost in World War II. Source—Wikipedia.com

### **USSVI Constitution and Bylaws**

### **Constitution (continued from December issue)**

#### ARTICLE XV – AMENDMENTS

Section 1. Any regular member in good standing may submit proposed amendments to amend this Constitution by forwarding, either by the Postal Service or by email, the proposed amendments to the Chairman of the Constitution & Bylaws Committee, postmarked, on or before March 1st of the year in which they are to be considered.

Section 2: The Constitution and Bylaws Committee will submit to the National Board those Proposed Amendments approved by the Committee and in accordance with the criteria as stated in the Bylaws. Section 3. The Constitution shall be amended by a two-thirds majority of the votes cast in the National Election of the organization: provided that the proposed changes have been placed on the National Ballot and provided to all members in good standing at their last known Postal or email address, as prescribed in the National Bylaws.

Section 4. Amendments which are passed will become effective at the close of the Annual Business Meeting. Section 5. Amendments submitted by the membership and passed shall remain in place for a period of three years from acceptance and may be changed by ballot in their fourth year. Should at any time in that period the amendment be deemed by the Board of Directors as not in the best interest of the organization, they, and only they, may submit an amendment at the next balloting opportunity to change it without waiting the three year period. The result of that ballot will start a new three- year period.

Section 6: No Amendment to the Constitution or Bylaws shall appear on the Ballot without review and approval by the Board of Directors

Section 7: All Proposed Amendments approved by the Constitution and Bylaws Committee may be placed on the ballot following review and approval by the Board of Directors. Included with each amendment will be a statement, from the National Board, stating in 25 words or less why the board is for or against the amendment. Also on the ballot for each amendment will be a statement, in 25 words or less, from the author of the Proposed Amendment, stating his reason for submitting the Proposed Amendment.

### Bylaws (continued from December issue)

ARTICLE VI – COMMITTEES
Section 2. MEMBERSHIP COMMITTEE

A. The Membership Committee shall be a Standing Committee.

- B. The Membership Committee shall be chaired by the National Junior Vice-Commander and have as regular members the National Office Manager, and other members as deemed necessary by the National Junior Vice Commander; such members being first approved by the Board of Directors. An administrative budget may be funded through an annual budget request to the National Senior Vice-Commander for inclusion in the USSVI National Budget. The committee Chairman shall annually submit a report of the operations of the committee to the National Secretary for inclusion in the committee reports; such report is to be submitted no later than 30 days prior to the pending National Convention.
- C. The duties of the Membership Committee shall include but not be limited to:
- a. Receive applications from new members.
- b. Determine eligibility requirements of each applicant.
- c. Maintain a permanent record of applications and membership.
- d. Provide each new member with a membership packet.
