Section 3: The organization engages in various projects and deeds that bring about the perpetual remembrance of those shipmates who have given the supreme sacrifice. USSVI also endeavors to educate all third parties it comes in contact with about the services United States submariners performed and how the sacrifices of lost shipmates made possible the freedom and lifestyle Americans enjoy today.



It's hard to imagine but it was 47 years ago this past May 22nd that we lost the USS Scorpion SSN-589.

A brief note about Diana... her surgery went well and she has had no pain in the incision. She gets 36 staples removed next Tuesday, June 9.

Subvets have habits! Some good

and some not so good. If you have a bad one you have probably found it difficult if not impossible to quit. You have probably discovered that willpower alone doesn't usually work.

Jesus told a story that illustrates the most important single principle in breaking a sinful (bad) habit. Besides, no one want to break a GOOD one! Jesus tells about a man who was inhabited by an evil spirit. When the demon was expelled, the evil spirit passed through waterless (dry) places, seeking rest. Finding none, it decided to return to the man. To the demon's satisfaction, he saw that his original living space was unoccupied. The demon then found seven other spirits even more evil than itself to go and live also. Sadly, the man, who just a short time earlier had been dancing with joy, was now worse off than he had been before (Luke 11:24-26).

The man failed in his quest for freedom because he didn't understand the principle of replacement. None of us can overcome evil by simply renouncing it. We must substitute that which was evil and replace it with that which is good. Sinful habits can-



not be broken without replacing them with righteous (good) ones.

Try this simple experiment.
Think of the number eight.
Have you visualized it? If yes,
then use your willpower to stop
thinking about the number eight
right now!

You will find that you can't do it because we cannot by sheer willpower stop thinking about the number eight. When you try to push it out of our mind it actually causes us to focus our attention on it.

We can, however, push it out of our minds by thinking about something else. Something like remembering things about your mother while growing up or some other person who was significant in your early years. Reminisce about your family, whether you are still connected with them or disconnected. When you concentrate on the new information, you will stop thinking about the number eight.

The Apostle Paul in writing to the Christians in Philippi shares what will cause us to experience the peace that only God can give.







Cold War Medal update:

Cold War Medal Update 05 ► H.R.2067 | Recognition Overdue

As Americans, we have a long and storied tradition of honoring the millions of men and women who have served our country throughout generations of armed conflict. We have built memorials and museums, issued medals, and designated national holidays to commemorate our veterans' service and ensure that their legacy will live on for generations to come. There also lie heroes that time has forgotten - whose names and actions are not written in the text of history books or etched into the walls of memorials. Millions of brave service members whose commitment to our nation ended the Cold War, after more than forty years. They worked quietly, or behind the scenes but prevented the world from dovetailing into nuclear war.

While the world was focused on wars raging in places like Korea and Vietnam, these men and women worked tirelessly to ensure that the tens of thousands of nuclear missiles the United States and the Soviet Union had aimed at each other's shores were never launched. They served on remote B-52 bomber bases, maintained missile silos, defended checkpoints and gathered intelligence in order to save our nation, and the world, from the devastating consequences of a nuclear catastrophe. The Cold War ended on December 26, 1991, but our heroes received no parades, celebrations or even so much as a public thank you. Although there were no major battles or combat over the forty-four year span of the Cold War, it is what these men and women prevented from happening that deserves our highest honor and appreciation.

It is long past time that our Cold War veterans receive the proper recognition that they deserve. While Democrats and Republicans rarely agree on much in Washington these days, honoring our veterans is an issue that transcends party lines. That is why Reps. Steve Israel (D-NY) and David Jolly (R-FL) reached across the aisle to introduce legislation that will award a military service medal to members of the Armed Forces who served honorably during the Cold War. The Cold War Service Medal Act of 2015 (H.R. 2067) authorizes the Secretary of Defense to issue medals to members of the U.S. Armed Forces who were honorably discharged after having served on active duty for at least 24 consecutive months during the Cold War, deployed outside the continental United States for at least 30 days during those years, or performed other Cold War service as the Secretary of Defense may prescribe.

The bill's sponsors are urging their colleagues to bring this legislation to the floor of the House for a vote. They owe it to Cold War veterans and their families to show them the respect and appreciation for their valor and the silent sacrifices they made to protect our country and our freedom. It is never too late to right a wrong, and presenting these men and women with the medal they have earned is the least we can do to honor their courage and their sacrifice. 





A Prayer from the George S. Patton Archives rarely heard by the general public

I am sure that all of us brothers have watched the famous movie "Patton" and are now familiar with the famous prayer that he asked a Methodist Chaplin to create for him on the subject of the bad weather threating the relief of Bastogne and the rescue of the 101st Airborne who were surrounded. What very few of us have heard is his prayer the next morning in front of a small Catholic chapel in Bastogne, drops to his knees and prays. Here is that prayer.

General George S. Patton, The Next Morning after the Relieving Bastogne:

"Sir, this is Patton again," he begins with an air of contrition. "And I beg to report complete progress. Sir, it seems to me that You have been much better informed about the situation than I was, because it was that awful weather which I cursed You so much which made it possible for the German army to commit suicide. That, Sir, was a brilliant military move," and I bow humbly to Your supreme genius."

Note: If you have ever watched "Band of Brothers" you will also be reminded that the 101st Airborne never thought they need to be rescued anyways. LOL!



The Jolly Roger and the Submarine Service

British Admiral of the Fleet Sir Arthur Wilson VC, the Controller of the Royal Navy, summed up the opinion of many in the Admiralty at the time when he said in 1901 "[Submarines are] underhand, unfair, and damned un-English. ... treat all submarines as pirates in wartime ... and hang all crews."[19][20] In response, Lieutenant Commander (later Admiral Sir) Max Horton first flew the Jolly Roger on return to port after sinking the German cruiser SMS Hela and the destroyer SMS S-116 in 1914 while in command of the E class submarine HMS E9.[21]


