Sections of the USSVI Creed

Creed:

That their dedication, deeds and supreme sacrifice be a constant source of motivation toward greater accomplishments. Pledge loyalty and patriotism to the United States of America and its Constitution.

Section 2: In addition to perpetuating the memory of departed shipmates, USSVI provides a way for all Submariners to gather for mutual benefit and enjoyment. The common heritage as Submariners is strengthened by camaraderie. USSVI supports a strong United States Submarine Force.

Pernetual remembrance

Section 3: The organization engages in various projects and deeds that bring about the perpetual remembrance of those shipmates who have given the supreme sacrifice. USSVI also endeavors to educate all third parties it comes in contact with about the services United States submariners performed and how the sacrifices of lost shipmates made possible the freedom and lifestyle Americans enjoy today.



Hello! Carolina Piedmont Base, I hope that everyone is enjoying the crazy cycle of weather that is the Carolinas in the late winter. Mother Nature needs to get back on her meds.

We have talked about the possibility of adopting a highway (or better known as the high way clean-up project)

I am not sure if we ever put the requirement details out there, here is the program requirements off the NCDOT website, I am sure there is a similar information section from SCDOT

Adopt-A-Highway Program Details:

There is no fee associated with adopting a roadway.

There is a four year agreement between the NCDOT and the Adopt-A-Highway volunteer (s).

Adopted roadways have a minimum length of two miles.

The agreement requires a roadside litter cleanup four times a year or more often if needed.

Each participant in the Adopt -A-Highway group must view the safety video (on the Website we can work out a way to view as a group)

Cleanups involve both sides of the road within the adopted two-mile section of roadway.

A cleanup report is to be submitted after each cleanup.

Filled bags of trash will be picked up by the NCDOT when requested through the cleanup report.

Bags with items for recycling shall be taken to a local recycling center by the volunteer group.

Adopt a Highway groups can obtain safety vests, gloves, and bags at their NCDOT county maintenance office.

Adopt a Highway signs with a recognition panel will be installed, one at each end of the adopted roadway.

The process to Adopt -A -

Highway

Discuss the desired roadway with the NCDOT AAH coordinator in the county we would like to adopt a highway (Union, Mecklenburg, Iredell, Gaston or others?)

Complete the apply to adopt a highway online form (NCDOT website)

Complete a sign design form

Start cleaning up

Let's discuss it would be a good way to give back, get some fresh air and advertise the base.

In Memory of Hal Rutter

As I sat down at my PC this week to read the obituary of my dear friend Hal Rutter, I wondered. How can you sum up 88 years of someone's life in 300 words? How can you put onto paper decades of life experiences and accomplishments; adventures and personal relationships? What could you possibly say in a few words that would tell the world who this person was and what he meant to his family, friends, shipmates and acquaintances?

The fact is, you can't. Hal was not famous. No autobiography or book will ever be written about him. You can't just sit in your easy chair next week and read about the extraordinary life of this wonderful person. The experiences he lived while on board a captured German U-Boat during World War II and his beloved US diesel boats are now gone forever. The things he saw during his 88 years were quite miraculous.

For example, the year he was born, 1929, was the great American Stock Market crash. It was the end of an era known as the roaring 20's. A German made airship called Graf Zeppelin made the first non-stop transit of the Pacific Ocean. The Dow Jones peaked at 381. There were no cell phones, personal computers or televisions. The very first Academy Awards was held that year. Ford Motor Company's most popular car was the Model A and it cost \$385. What a difference 88 years makes.

All we have from this day forward are our memories and our photographs of Hal and Dee. For those of us that were closest to him, we will always remember a man that we wanted to be around. He was fun. He was full of life. I loved his wonderful smile, that mischievous laugh and the twinkle in his eye. He loved his sashimi, raw oysters, escargot, and Pinot Noir and I, for one, loved sharing them with him. The joy on his face when we went out together will never leave my memory. He was outgoing and he loved to dance and hug the ladies. He loved his wife Dee and his children.

Hal was dedicated to his veterans groups; VFW, American Legion and of course his brothers in the USSVI Submarine organization and we were dedicated to him. He was very proud of his service. We were in awe of him and were all very proud to have known him. He will be dearly missed for many years to come. We have lost another great veteran from what is often called the "Greatest Generation".

Hal always got up to dance and sing when the Frank Sinatra hit "My Way" was played. This was his trademark song. Until the day he left us, he did it his way. Good for you Hal. Frank would be proud. We will miss you! Until we see you again Sailor, smooth sailing.


