


It is with sadness I report that Margie Harris died a few weeks ago.

Hope to see many of you at Newton's Old Soldier Parade.





CAPT. ADAMS, REST YOUR OAR

Your chaplain has extended the condolences of the Submarine Veterans of North Carolina to the family of Retired Navy CAPT. Ollie Buford Adams, 86, of Southern Pines, NC. CAPT. Adams saw service during World War II aboard the submarines O-2, DRUM (SS-228), and TUSK (SS-426). He sailed on his eternal patrol on 21 April 2007, and was interred in Arlington National Cemetery (Section 48, Site 591).

He is survived by his daughter Sandra Bustle and a granddaughter. He had been a member of the Tarheel Chapter of U.S. Submarine Veterans of World War II since 1996.



S-28'S WILMINGTON ADDRESS

Your chaplain tries to be prepared for any and all contingencies. His experience over the years with Don Small, Mike Burkholder, and Chuck Jensen has taught him to be ever-prepared for a nod of the head and the words, "And we'll now hear a word from Chaplain Bill."

It was no exception back in May when we gathered in Wilmington for the long-awaited dedication of our memorial to North Carolina's World War II lost boat, the S-28. Your chaplain, prepared as usual, waited to be called upon for a few words pertinent to the occasion. But, alas (perhaps we should add "and alack"), we were never called upon to deliver the message that we had so diligently rehearsed. To what better use can we put those words than to include them months later in our "Corner." But there is a disclaimer: the message is not original with us. It is adapted from words delivered a long time ago by a bewhiskered President of these United States. We call it, "S-28's Wilmington Address," and it goes like this. "Three score and three years ago, after six war patrols and while training U.S. sailors-both 50 of her own crew and those aboard the U.S. Coast Guard cutter RELIANCE--the 21-year-old U.S. submarine S-28 was lost with all hands on Independence Day of 1944 in 8,400 feet of water off the coast of Oahu. "Today, we are still engaged in great conflicts worldwide, testing whether our Nation, or any nation so conceived and so dedicated, can long endure. We have come to dedicate this memorial as a poignant reminder of those S-28 sailors named thereon as well as the unnamed crews of the 51 remaining submarines who gave their lives during World War Two that our Nation and others might live. It is altogether fitting and proper that we should do this.

"But, in a larger sense, we cannot dedicate--we cannot consecrate--we cannot hallow--this memorial. The brave men, living and dead, who are memorialized here, have consecrated it far above our poor power to add or detract. The world will little note, nor long remember what we say here, but it should never be allowed to forget what they did for our Nation during all wars as well as in peacetime.

"It is for us the living, rather, to be dedicated here to the unfinished work which they who fought have thus far so nobly advanced. It is rather for us to be here dedicated to the great task remaining before us--that from these honored dead we take increased devotion to that cause for which they gave the last full measure of devotion--that we here highly resolve that these dead should not have died in vain--that this

Nation, under God, shall have a new birth of Freedom--and that government of the people, by the people, for the people, shall not perish from the earth."

We hope and pray that those who read these words share their concern.





"YOU WORRY ME!"

By American Airlines Pilot - Captain John Maniscalco

I've been trying to say this since 9-11, but you worry me. I wish you didn't. I wish when I walked down the streets of this country that I love, that your color and culture still blended with the beautiful human landscape we enjoy in this country.

But you don't blend in anymore. I notice you, and it worries me. I notice you because I can't help it anymore. People from your homelands, professing to be Muslims, have been attacking and killing my fellow citizens and our friends for more than 20 years now. I don't fully understand their grievances and hate, but I know that nothing can justify the inhumanity of their attacks. On September 11, nineteen ARAB-MUSLIMS hijacked four jetliners in my country. They cut the throats of women in front of children and brutally stabbed to death others. They took control of those planes and crashed them into buildings killing thousands of proud fathers, loving sons, wise grandparents, elegant daughters, best friends, favorite coaches, fearless public servants, and children's mothers.

The Palestinians Celebrated, the Iraqis were overjoyed as was most of the Arab world. So, I notice you now. I don't want to be worried. I don't want to be consumed by the same rage and hate and prejudice that have destroyed the soul of these terrorists. But I need your help. As a rational American, trying to protect my country and family in an irrational and unsafe world, I must know how to tell the difference between you, and the Arab/Muslim terrorist. How do I differentiate between the true Arab / Muslim-Americans and the Arab Muslim terrorists in our communities who are attending our schools, enjoying our parks, and living in OUR communities under the protection of OUR constitution, while they plot the next attack that will slaughter these same good neighbors and children? The events of September 11th changed the answer. It is not my responsibility to determine which of you embraces our great country,

with ALL of its religions, with ALL of its different citizens, with all of its faults. It is time for every Arab/Muslim in this country to determine it for me. I want to know, I demand to know, and I have a right to know, whether or not you love America? Do you pledge allegiance to its flag? Do you proudly display it in front of your house, or on your car? Do you pray in your many daily prayers that Allah will bless this nation, that He will protect and prosper it? Or do you pray that Allah with destroy it in one of your Jihads? Are you thankful for the freedom that only this nation affords? A freedom that was paid for by the blood of hundreds of thousands of patriots who gave their lives for this country? Are you willing to preserve this freedom by also paying the ultimate sacrifice? Do you love America?

If this is your commitment, then I need YOU to start letting ME know about it. Your Muslim leaders in this nation should be flooding the media at this time with hard facts on your faith, and what hard actions you are taking as a community and as a religion to protect the United States of America.

Please, no more benign overtures of regret for the death of the innocent because I worry about who you regard as innocent. No more benign overtures of condemnation for the unprovoked attacks because I worry about what is unprovoked to you. I am not interested in any more sympathy. I am only interested in action. What will you do for America - our great country - at this time of crisis, at this time of war? I want to see Arab-Muslims waving the AMERICAN flag in the streets. I want to hear you chanting "Allah Bless America" I want to see young Arab/Muslim men enlisting in the military. I want to see a commitment of money, time, and emotion to the victims of this butchering and to this nation as a whole.

The FBI has a list of over 400 people they want to talk to regarding the WTC attack. Many of these people live and socialize right now in Muslim communities. You know them. You know where they are. Hand them over to us, now! But I have seen little even approaching this sort of action. Instead I have seen an already closed and secretive

community close even tighter. You have disappeared from the streets. You have posted armed security guards at your facilities. You have threatened lawsuits. You have screamed for protection from reprisals. The very few Arab/Muslim representatives that HAVE appeared in the media were defensive and equivocating. They seemed more concerned with making sure that the United States proves who was responsible before taking action. They seemed more concerned with protecting their fellow Muslims from violence directed towards them in the United States and abroad than they did with supporting our country and denouncing "leaders" like Khadafi, Hussein, Farrakhan, and Arafat. If the true teachings of Islam proclaim tolerance and peace and love for all people, then I want chapter and verse from the Koran and statements from popular Muslim leaders to back it up. What good is it if the teachings in the Koran are good, and pure, and true, when your "leaders" are teaching fanatical interpretations, terrorism, and intolerance? It matters little how good Islam SHOULD BE if huge numbers of the world's Muslims interpret the teachings of Mohammed incorrectly and adhere to a degenerative form of the religion. A form that has been demonstrated to us over and over again. A form whose structure is built upon a foundation of violence, death, and suicide. A form whose members are recruited from the prisons around the world. A form whose members (some as young as five years old) are seen day after day, week in and week out, year after a year, marching in the streets around the world, burning effigies of our presidents, burning the American flag, shooting weapons into the air. A form whose members convert from a peaceful religion, only to take up arms against the great United States of America, the country of their birth. A form whose rules are so twisted, that their traveling members refuse to show their faces at airport security checkpoints, in the name of Islam.

We will NEVER allow the attacks of September 11, or any others for that matter, to take away that which is so precious to us: Our rights under the greatest constitution in the world.

I want to know where every Arab Muslim in this country stands and I think it is my right and the right of every true citizen of this country to demand it. A right paid for by the blood of thousands of my brothers and sisters who died protecting the very constitution that is protecting you and your family. I am pleading with you to let me know.

I want you here as my brother, my neighbor, my friend, as a fellow American. But there can be no gray areas or ambivalence regarding your allegiance and it is up to YOU, to show ME, where YOU stand. Until then, "YOU WORRY ME!"

"SAILOR, REST YOUR OAR"

THIS WEEK'S HONORARY UNSUBSCRIBE goes to Eugene B. Fluckey. A career Naval officer, Fluckey served on various ships until April 27, 1943, when he was given command of Barb, a submarine. He became one of the most accomplished submarine skippers of the war, credited with sinking more tonnage than any other submarine captain during World War II, including a Japanese aircraft carrier, a cruiser, and a frigate.

Fluckey was also responsible for another wartime milestone: he commanded the only landing of U.S. forces on the Japanese Home Islands, sending a landing party ashore to blow up a train line, taking a supply train at the same time. He ordered that the raiders consist of representatives from every division on his submarine (and divided between regular Navy and Reserve sailors) to help spread the credit, and specified that as many of the men as possible be ex-Boy Scouts since he figured they'd be better equipped to find their way in enemy territory.

Fluckey received four Navy Cross Medals for extraordinary heroism, and the Medal of Honor for "conspicuous gallantry and intrepidity". His proudest accomplishment during the war was that all of his men not only survived, but came home without any combat-related injuries. He retired as a Rear Admiral in 1972, and died on June

28. He was 93.
