### Happy Birthday to the United States Submarine Service!



April 11, 2013 is commemorated by the United States submarine community as Submarine Day, the anniversary of April 11, 1900 when the American Government purchased its first commissioned submarine, the USS Holland. USS Holland was the United States Navy's first commissioned submarine, named for her Irish-American inventor, John Philip Holland, although not the first submarine of the US Navy, which was the 1862 Alligator. The boat was originally laid down as Holland VI, and launched on 17 May 1897.

Holland VI eventually proved her validity and worthiness as a warship and was ultimately purchased by the U.S. government for the sum of \$160,000 on 11 April 1900. She was considered to be the first truly successful craft of her type. It was decommissioned on July 17, 1905.

On June 19, 1916 the Submarine Force United States Atlantic Fleet was established and on June 28, 1917 the Submarine Force United States Pacific Fleet was established.

Today all 71 combatant U.S. Submarines are nuclear powered. The fleet consists of 18 Ohio Class ballistic or guided Missile subs, 7 Virginia Class fast attacks, and 46 Los Angeles and Seawolf Class attack submarines.

### Save the Clamagore!

The USS Clamagore (SS 343) was commissioned in 1945. After going through conversions to GUPPY 2 and GUPPY 3 she was decommissioned in 1975 and became a Submarine Museum at Patriots Point (PP) near Charleston, SC (The only GUPPY 3 Remaining). PP does not have the funds to maintain the Sub. Recently PP agreed to allow the Clamagore Veterans Association (CVA) to fund and engineering survey of the boat. If the boat is deemed sound, PP will give CVA 2 years to raise the funds to Save the Clamagore and, if not sound, the Clamagore will become a reef.

### **Tolling of the Boats**

At Each Base Meeting We Honor the U.S. Submarines and Crews that were Lost at Sea Following are the Submarines Honored in the Second Quarter

#### **Boats Lost in April**

#### USS Pickerel (SS-177)

Lost on April 3, 1943 with the loss of 74 officers and men while on her 7th war patrol. She was lost off Honshu. The exact cause of her loss has never been determined, but her OP area contained numerous minefields.



#### USS Snook (SS-279)

Lost on April 8,1945 with the loss of 84 officers and men. Snook ranks 10th in total Japanese tonnage sunk and is tied for 9th in the number of ships sunk. She was lost near Hainan Island, possibly sunk by a Japanese submarine.



#### USS Thresher (SSN-593)

Lost on April 10, 1963 with the loss of 112 crew members and 17 civilian technicians during deep-diving exercises. 15 minutes after reaching test depth, she communicated with USS Skylark that she was having problems. Skylark heard noises "like air rushing into an air tank" then, silence. Rescue ship Recovery (ASR-43) subsequently recovered bits of debris, including gloves and bits of internal insulation. Photographs taken by Trieste proved that the submarine had broken up, taking all hands on board to their deaths in 1,400 fathoms of water, some 220 miles east of Boston.



#### USS Gudgeon (SS-211)

Lost on April 18, 1944 with the loss of 80 men off Saipan. Winner of 5 Presidential Unit Citations, Gudgeon was on her 12th war patrol and most likely sank due to a combined air and surface attack. Gudgeon was the first US submarine to go on patrol from Pearl Harbor after the Japanese attack. On that patrol, she became the first US submarine to sink an enemy warship, picking off the submarine I-173.



#### **USS Grenadier (SS-210)**

Lost on April 22, 1943 near Penang, with no immediate loss of life. She was on her 6th war patrol. While stalking a convoy, she was spotted by a plane and dove. While passing 130 feet, the plane dropped a bomb causing severe damage. She was lodged on the bottom 270 feet and the crew spent hours fighting fires and flooding. When she surfaced, she had no propulsion and was attacked by another plane, which her crew shot down. But when enemy ships arrived, the CO abandoned ship and scuttled the boat. Of the 61 crew members taken prisoner, 57 survived the war.



### 25th Anniversary of the Fatal Fire Aboard the USS Bonefish



On 24 April 1988, Bonefish was exercising with the guided missile frigate Carr 160 mi (260 km) off the coast of Florida. While the sub was submerged, seawater began leaking onto cables and electrical buses in a battery supply cableway. Electrical arcing between cables caused an explosion which flashed into a fire within minutes, with temperatures in the battery spaces reaching 1,200° Fahrenheit. The heat was so intense that it melted crew members' shoe soles in the spaces above. Bonefish was surfaced and its crew ordered to abandon ship. Eighty-nine crew members were rescued by whale-boat and helicopter crews from Carr and the aircraft carrier John F. Kennedy. One Search and Rescue Swimmer from HS-7, Anti-Submarine Warfare Operator Third Class (AW3) Larry Grossman spent over three hours in the ocean and was credited with saving 19 lives. He later received the Navy and Marine Corps Medal for Heroism. With the fire extinguished, Bonefish was subsequently towed into Charleston, South Carolina by salvage and rescue ship Hoist. The damage to Bonefish was deemed too extensive to warrant repair, and a decision was made to decommission her and dispose of her via scrapping.

#### Three Bonefish sailors were killed

Lieutenant Ray Everts, PO 1st Class Bob Bordelon, PO 3rd Class Marshal T. Lindgren As OOD he went up to open escape hatch and was overcome by smoke and died. The radioman sending alert signals and was overcome by smoke and died. Part of group helping injured when he was overcome by smoke and died.



Boats Lost in May	
USS Lagarto (SS-371) Lost on May 3, 1945 with the loss of 88 men near the Gulf of Siam. On her 2nd war patrol, she is believed to have been lost to a radar equipped minelayer. This minelayer was sunk by the USS Hawkbill two weeks later	
USS Scorpion (SSN-589) While returning to Norfolk, VA from a Mediterranean deployment, on May 22, 1968 she reported her position to be about 50 miles south of the Azores. Scorpion was never heard from again. The exact cause of her loss has never been determined.	
USS Squalus (SS-192) Lost on May 23, 1939 due to a catastrophic valve failure during a test dive off the Isle of Shoals. Squalus sank came to rest keel down in 240 feet of water. Commander Charles Momsen and Navy divers on the USS Falcon (ASR-2) rescued 33 survivors using the diving bell he invented. 26 men drowned in the after compartments. Squalus was raised and recommissioned as the USS Sailfish.	The state of the s
USS Stickleback (SS-415) Lost on May 30, 1958 when it sank off Hawaii while under tow after collision with USS Silverstein (DE-534). The entire crew was taken off prior to sinking.	
Boats Lost in June	
USS Herring (SS-233) Lost on June 1, 1944 with the loss of 80 men near Matsuwa Island. Herring was on her 8th war patrol and was conducting a surface attack when a shore battery spotted her and made two direct hits on her conning tower and causing her loss. Before being sunk, she had sank a freighter and a passenger-cargoman. Herring was the only US submarine sunk by a land battery.	
USS R-12 (SS-89) Lost on June 12, 1943 with the loss of 42 men near Key West, FL during a practice torpedo approach. The cause was probably due to flooding through a torpedo tube. The CO and two other men on the bridge survived, as did 18 crew members on liberty at the time of the accident.	
USS Golet (SS-361) Lost on June 14, 1944 with the loss of 82 men. On her 2nd war patrol, Golet was apparently lost in battle with antisubmarine forces north of Honshu.	
USS Bonefish (SS-223) Lost on June 19, 1945 with the loss of 85 men when sunk near Suzu Misaki. Winner of 3 Navy Unit Citations, Bonefish was on her 8th war patrol. After sinking a passenger-cargoman, Bonefish was subjected to a savage depth charge attack.	
USS S-27 (SS-132) Lost on June 19, 1942 when it grounded off Amchitka Island. She was on the surface in poor visibility, charging batteries and drifted into the shoals. When she could not be freed and started listing, the captain got the entire crew to shore (400 yards away) in relays using a 3-man rubber raft. The entire crew was subsequently rescued.	
USS 0-9 (SS-70) Lost on Jun 20, 1941 with the loss of 34 men when it foundered off Isle of Shoals, 15 miles from Portsmouth, NH. O-9 submerged at 0738 to conduct deep submergence tests, the sub did not surface thereafter but was crushed by the pressure of the water 402 feet below. 33 men lost.	
USS Runner (SS-275) Lost between June 26th and July 4th 1943 with the loss of 78 men. Runner was on her 3rd war patrol probably due to a mine. Prior to her loss, she reported sinking a freighter and a passenger-cargoman off the Kuriles. This boat's last known ship sunk happened on June 26th, so she probably hit that	

mine on or after that date but before July 4th, when she was scheduled back at Midway



# USS Scorpion SSN 589 Memorial Service May 25, 2013 CCB Participation



Joel Kurt Watkins Machinist's Mate First Class United States Navy

Joel Kurt Watkins was born March 23, 1943 at Fort Bragg, North Carolina. Joel graduated from Willow Brook High School, Villa Park, Illinois and attended Milliken University at Decatur prior to entering the Navy on June 6, 1962.

Upon completion of recruit training at Great Lakes, Illinois, he attended Machinist's Mate School at Great Lakes. He next attended basic submarine school at Groton, Connecticut. Joel completed basic nuclear training in February 1965.

Prior to reporting aboard the USS Scorpion, Joel served on the submarine Menhaden and the fleet ballistic missile submarine James K. Polk. Joel earned his silver dolphins on December 16, 1963 when he qualified in submarines. He was authorized to wear the Good Conduct Medal and the National Defense Medal.

Joel is survived by his widow, the former Peggy Lee Lawser of Lombard, Illinois; two daughters, Nancy and Kelly; and his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Joel B. Watkins also of Lombard.



**Invocation:** Bill Dixon, Butterbean, gave the invocation.

**Pledge of Allegiance:** Vice Commander Backes led the attendees in the Pledge of Allegiance

**Tolling of the Boats:** Tolling of the Boats was deferred to the upcoming regularly scheduled meeting on April 13, 2013.

**Recognition of World War II Submarine Veterans in Attendance:** There were no World War II Submarine Veterans in Attendance for this meeting.

**Holland Club Presentations:** No Holland Club presentations were made at the meeting.

**Introductions:** Vice Commander Backes introduced guests Russ Dressell and Tom Russell to the Attendees. Russ Dressell is a retired CIA employee who, while never qualified in submarines, worked with submarines and submariners many times in his career. He is considering join-

ing CCB as an Associate Member. Tom Russell, founder of "Step Up for Soldiers" was invited as a guest speaker to represent his local charity organization as a potential charity for CCB support.

**Guest Speaker: Thomas Russell, Founder of Step Up for Soldiers** 

**Step Up for Soldiers** is a local, all volunteer group providing renovations, recreation, and recognition for recently disabled veterans in eastern North Carolina.

Step Up for Soldiers mission statement is "to provide disabled veterans who experienced loss of limb and mobility problems with the resources necessary to adjust in a postwar environment. As a result of the events and fundraisers, sponsored by Step Up For Soldiers, we strive to not only enhance their lives and those of their families but also help to restore their confidence and positive self-image".

Step Up For Soldiers was founded in 2004, by Tom Russell whose goal was to build a wheelchair accessible ramps for two local National Guard Soldiers who had lost their legs during their tours of duty. Since that simple idea was conceived, the organization has grown significantly thanks to the support of dedicated volunteers and local media and business sponsors that embraced the importance of helping our Iraqi and Afghan heroes who did so much for our liberty. The Step Up group has sponsored events such as golf tournaments, marathons, and "mud runs" to raise donations to support their building projects and programs such as "Packages from Home". The "Packages from Home" program collects and acquires goody bags to send to soldiers deployed from eastern North Carolina into war zones.

Though the local 1/120th Combined Arms Battalion, Wilmington, NC is their primary focus, Step Up gladly serves all five branches of the military. Thus, whenever any soldier of veteran of the current conflicts needs help, the organization will deploy all resources available to assist to the best of their abilities.

Moreover, since its inception, the purpose of the organization has expanded to provide funding to soldiers who need financial assistance as well as home modifications, family support and more.

Raising awareness and visibility for our heroes is an important byproduct of their efforts. They consistently become involved with and host public events such as parades, golf tournaments and make sure that their special mobile memorial stands out to create attention and recognition for these special heroes. The Step Up group is particularly proud of their involvement in helping to develop the <u>Fallen Soldier Memorial Garden</u> which recognizes the fallen in southeastern North Carolina and provides a peaceful and special place for reflection and respect. The Memorial is surrounded by a lovely garden and brick pavers which can be purchased to signify personal displays of recognition.

The Fallen Soldiers Memorial was dedicated June 21, 2008. This was a great day for all of those involved with Step Up For Soldiers as well the members of the 30th Battalion North Carolina Army National Guard.

The Fallen Soldiers Memorial is located on North Carolina National Guard property at Wilmington International Airport at 2412 Infantry Road.

Step up for Soldiers is a non-profit 501-(c) (3) organization, dedicated to members of the Armed Forces of the United States of America. All monetary donations are tax deductible and all donations are used for projects in eastern North Carolina.

Thanks to the Members for this fantastic response to support this project! Thus far the Base has spent \$1,356.00 for the float centerpiece and the banners to go on the sides of the float trailer. Barry displayed two of the banners at the meeting. The longest will go from the front of the trailer along the side to the tandem wheel well and represents the Coastal Carolina Base. The shorter ban-

ner will start above the wheel well and go down the side to the rear of the trailer and will highlight the *S-28* Memorial.

Fabrication of the submarine centerpiece will be completed Thursday, April 4th and Barry plans to travel to High Point to take delivery on Tuesday April 9th utilizing a covered transport trailer graciously volunteered by John Williamson. The centerpiece will then be taken to be stored in a pole barn on Richard Schrum's property in Richlands. Commander Terry Kuhn will organize working parties to prepare, paint and mount the centerpiece on Richard Schrum's trailer. The plan is to build a movable mount which will securely support the submarine display on the trailer, but can be easily removed for storage and to free up the trailer for other uses. The working parties will fiberglass, paint and detail the submarine centerpiece as well as design and build the mount. If you have skills that would be helpful in preparation of our float please contact one of the base officers to be included in one of the working parties.

Our goal is to debut the new Coastal Carolina Base submarine float at the Southport July 4<sup>th</sup> Parade.

Golf Tournament Fund Raiser: Bernie Maguire reported that the CCB Golf Tournament Fund Raiser is getting rolling. The Tournament will raise money for the CCB and a veteran's charitable organization such as Wounded Warriors or Step Up for Soldiers. The team needs more volunteers to help recruit sponsors, donations, event organization, and advertising. The event is currently planned for September 28, 2013 at either the Wilmington Municipal Golf Course, Echo Farms or Olde Point Golf Course. The intention is that it will be an annual event for the Base.

The Tournament Team is recruiting volunteers for to head the following activities associated with the golf tournament;

- Sponsorship Recruitment of sponsors for each hole at the tournament (\$100/hole)
- Door Prizes obtain donations of prizes for various achievements in the tournament

 Food – Recruit a restaurant like Chick Filet to donate a lunch meal for each participant at the tournament.

In return for the donation each participating Base would receive a biography of the sponsored crew member and a specially designed Scorpion Coin commemorating the Scorpion. We contacted MaryEtte and discussed the history of the memorial, the upcoming ceremony and sponsorship of one of the lost crew members. CCB asked to sponsor Joel Kurt Watkins MM1(SS) who was born in the Fayetteville area. If the Scorpion had not gone down that fateful day in 1968, Joel might very well be one of our members now

The Memorial Event will be held on May 25<sup>th</sup> at 10:00 am at the Norfolk Naval Submarine Base at the Scorpion Memorial on the pier. CCB members are invited to attend if possible.

### Memorial to Crews of the S-28 and the 52 Submarines Lost in WWII April 13, 2013

After the Azalea Festival, parade attendees joined other Base Members and guests at the Submarine Memorial at Battleship Park to pay homage to the crews of the S-28 and the 52 submarines lost in World War II. A brief memorial service was led by Jim Myers, Commander, North Carolina Submarine Veterans. The *USS S-28 (SS 133)* was lost on July 4<sup>th</sup>, 1944 on a routine training operation. Lost with her was her crew of 40 officers and enlisted men plus 10 shipmates in training.

Commander Myers commented that the North Carolina Submarine Veterans was started as an off-shoot of the World War II Submarine Veterans. The Tarheel Base was chartered in 1997 by the WWII Submarine Veterans to have quarterly meetings in each quadrant of North Carolina. One big event for the subvet organization was to commemorate the anniversary of the Pearl Harbor attack each year. This year the Tarheel Base is hosting the Pearl Harbor Dinner on Saturday, December 7. Commander Myers encouraged Coastal Carolina Base Members to plan to go to Cary to attend this dinner. He explained that the dinner is always a very good time. There are raffles, door prizes, good food and great submarine sailor interaction

Commander Myers continued by encouraging attendees to write nominations for USSVI national awards. He said that the NC Subvets have been very active in the USSVI awards program and have won many awards. The Coastal Carolina Base got the Golden Anchor Award last year for membership growth.

He also discussed the cost of maintenance of the two NC Subvet floats, the torpedo float and the submarine float. **Storekeepers Report:** Base Storekeeper, Frank Blackmon announced that he had a full assortment of patches and rocker panels for anyone who needs them.

Update on the Coastal Carolina Base Float: Base Treasurer, Barry Turano gave a report on the progress of the Coastal Carolina Base parade float project. Barry reported that he and Secretary Bill Underwood traveled to Carpenter Company in High Point to pick up the submarine centerpiece for the new Base float. Below is a picture of the submarine centerpiece shrink wrapped into a Styrofoam cradle.

Base Member John Williamson volunteered his covered car trailer for the transport from High Point to the storage point in Base Member Richard Schrum's barn in Richlands, NC. Many thanks to Barry, Bill, John and Richard for their contributions to the delivery of the centerpiece. The centerpiece is constructed of heavy duty solid Styrofoam and is approximately 14 ft long, 2 ft wide and 4 ft tall. Barry continued that the Styrofoam is vulnerable to dents, etc. until it is coated with a protective coating. He said that he has spoken with Line-X, a company that makes pickup truck bedliners, about the suitability of their product for putting a black protective coat on Styrofoam objects like our centerpiece. The local Line-X dealer and the Line-X headquarters technical group assured him that they routinely successfully coat Styrofoam objects with their product and it results in a smooth, durable end-product. Barry said that the cost of the coating would be approximately \$700.00 and asked for permission to expend the funds for coating the centerpiece.

MOTION: Barry Turano offered a MOTION that the Base approve the expenditure of approximately \$700.00 to have the centerpiece coated with a Line-X type product to protect the centerpiece and color it submarine black. The MOTION was SECONDED by

Frank Blackmon. In the ensuing discussion, it was pointed out that so far donations for the Base float had exceeded \$1,800.00 and thus far the Base has incurred expenses of approximately \$1,580.00 (including fabrication of the centerpiece, banners for the float and gas to deliver the centerpiece). Thus far the construction of the Base float has not impacted the Base's routine bank account at all. The MOTION PASSED by unanimous vote of the attendees.

Barry continued that a working party will be set up soon to make a few minor refinements to the centerpiece prior to coating. He explained that the leading edges of the sail, fairwater planes, stern planes, and rudder should be sanded to be more realistically hydrodynamic. Such a process can be done with normal sheetrock finishing tools and would give the centerpiece a much more realistic look. Any Member with such skills and a willingness to spend an afternoon or morning working on the centerpiece should contact Barry at b.turanol@charter.net.

Amazing!!!!!! Makes one wonder why humans can't get along with each other...........

Rescued eight years ago during a police drug raid in Atlanta, Georgia, the three friends were only cubs at the time at barely two months old. They had been kept as status symbol pets by the drug barons. Delivered to the Noah's Ark Animal Rescue Centre in Locust Grove, Georgia, the decision was made to keep the youngsters together, because of their budding rapport. 'We could have separated them, but since they came as a kind of family, the zoo decided to keep them together,' said Diane Smith, assistant director of Noah's Ark. 'To our knowledge, this is the only place where you'll find this combination of animals together.' Living with the zoo's founders for the past eight years, Shere Khan, Baloo and Leo have now moved to a purpose-built habitat where the US public can now witness first hand their touching relationships





'Now their habitat is sorted and they have been moved away from the children's zoo areas where the public couldn't really get a good look. 'It is possible to see Baloo, who is a 1000 lb bear, Shere Khan, a 350 lb tiger and Leo, who is also 350 lbs, messing around like brothers. 'They are totally oblivious to the fact that in any other circumstance they would not be friends.' Handled by Charles and Jama Hedgecoth, the zoo's owners and founders, the three friendly giants appear to have no comprehension of their animal differences. 'Baloo and Shere Khan are very close,' says Diane. 'That is because they rise early, and as Leo is a lion, he likes to spend most of the day sleeping. 'It is wonderful and magical to see a giant American Black Bear put his arm around a Bengal and then to see the tiger nuzzle up to the bear like a domestic cat. 'When Leo wakes up the

three of them mess around for most of the day before they settle down to some food.'

Surprisingly for three apex predators with the power to kill with a single bite or swipe of their paw, they are very relaxed around each other. 'They eat, sleep and play together,' said Jama. 'As they treat each other as siblings they will lie on top of each other for heat and simply for affection. 'At the moment they are getting used to their new habitat. 'Shere Khan is being quite reticent about the move, but Baloo, the bear, is very good at leading him on and making him feel comfortable and safe.' Explaining that the three 'brothers' have always seemed to share a unique bond, Charles said: 'Noah's Ark is their home and they could not possibly be separated from each other. 'You just have to remember who you're dealing with when you are with them, though. 'It's when you forget that these fellows are wild animals that you get yourself in trouble.' The trio's new habitat had to be constructed carefully, in order to accommodate its occupants. Jama said: 'The clubhouse had to be very sturdy for the guys, because they all sleep in it together,' She added: 'We had to include a creek, because the tiger and the bear both like to be in water.'

It was a shock to the nation and more so to the submarine service to have one of its newest submarines lost at sea. Many families of the Portsmouth/Kittery communities suffered great losses that day. Although it has been fifty years since that loss we, who served on submarines, still remember the loss of one of our own. Our hopes and prayers are with the families who lost members on that fateful day. Our pledge is that their loss will never be forgotten!

### Relatives gather to remember America's worst submarine disaster 50 years after 129 sailors lost their lives on USS Thresher

Family and friends who lost loved ones when the USS Thresher sank 50 years ago joined in tossing wreaths into the water Saturday in an emotional service in remembrance of the 129 Navy crew members and civilian technicians who lost their lives in the deadliest submarine disaster in U.S. History. Hundreds gathered for the memorial service at Portsmouth High School that concluded with a small group tossing three wreaths into the Piscataqua River. During the service, a bell tolled 129 times. The event, along with the dedication of a flagpole Sunday in Kittery, Maine, aim to call attention to the tragedy 220 miles off Cape Cod, which became the impetus for submarine safety improvements.

Don Wise Jr., 59, of Plaistow, N.H., who lost his dad, said the Thresher crew members were doing something special, serving on what was a technological marvel, the Navy's fastest and deepest-diving nuclear submarine. "They were going deeper and faster than anyone. I always considered my dad a hero and an adventurer," Wise said Saturday. "These memorials are how I connect my children and grandchildren with my dad."

Former Thresher crew member Frank DeStefano, 79, of Orange Park, Fla., said he owed his life to a three-day assignment to Washington that took him away from the submarine during the fateful sea trials. He said he's happy to see that annual memorial events provide an outlet for families and friends to grieve. "The only good part about these memorials is that we can help those who were really affected, like the families," DeStefano said. "And it's great to see the children that have come along."

After the ceremony, a rifle team fired shots as the wreaths - one each for Navy personnel and civilian technicians who died, and one for previous Thresher crew members - were tossed into the river.

#### Chinese Boomers A Bust Strategy Page, April 23

Taiwanese intelligence officials recently revealed (while answering questions before parliament) that China's Type 94 SSBN (ballistic missile carrying nuclear powered boat, also called "boomers") has not yet been commissioned. This was apparently in response to reports that a Type 94 class sub was seen recently undergoing what appeared to be sea trials. Taiwanese officials also stated that the JL-2 SLBM (Sea Launched Ballistic Missiles) that the Type 94 is designed to carry is still undergoing testing. It's no secret that China is eager to actually send one of its SSBNs out on a combat patrol. That's because, to date, China has never been able to do this. America, Russia, Britain, and France have all done so and still do. The U.S. has had SSBNs going out with nuclear armed, and ready to fire, missiles for over half a century. What is going on with China? There appears to be a combination of technical and political problems. Some of these problems are no longer state secrets but are being discussed in the state controlled media. What is known is that China has already produced two generations of SSBNs. In the early 1980s, the Type 92 SSBN was launched but had a lot of problems and never made it into service. It only went out for training in Chinese coastal waters. Only one was built. In the last decade the Type 94 showed up. This was believed, in the West, to be the Chinese SSBN that would go on patrol. This has never happened, at least not yet. Turns out that the Type 94 also had technical problems, and Chinese workers have been seen working on Type 94s for years.

The Type 94 seemed like it would enter service because it is simply a variant of the Type 93 class SSN (nuclear powered attack sub), which looks a lot like the three decade old Russian Victor III class SSN design . The first Type 93 entered service in 2006. The Type 94 SSBN looks like a Victor III with a missile compartment added. Taking a SSN design and adding extra compartments to hold the ballistic missiles is an old trick, pioneered by the United States in the 1950s to produce the first ever SSBNs. The Chinese appear to have done the same thing by taking their new Type 93 SSN and creating a larger Type 94 SSBN boat of 9,000 tons Page 24 The Silent Sentinel, May 2013 displacement. Priority was apparently given to construction of the Type 94, as having nuclear missiles able to reach the United States gives China more diplomatic clout than some new SSNs. The first Type 94 was completed two years ago. But it still has not gone to sea equipped with nuclear missiles.

This may be because after the first two new, 7,000 ton, Type 93 class SSNs went to sea, China apparently found their performance was not impressive at all. Not much more was expected from the Type 94s, except that they might be reliable enough to make a few combat patrols, just for the record. The 93s were too noisy and had a long list of more minor defects as well. It's unclear how many 93s will be built, probably no more than six (four already exist). More resources are apparently being diverted to the next SSN class, the 95, and the next SSBN, the Type 96. The first Type 95 is under construction and not expected to enter service until 2015. The Type 96 SSBN is still in the planning stages, apparently waiting to see how well (or not) the Type 95 SSN design works out.

The Type 93 and Type 94 were both over a decade in development and construction. Work began on the 94 class in the 1990s. For years all that was known was that the Chinese were having technical problems with the new design. The Type 94 is a modern SSBN, using technology bought from Russia, plus what was developed by the Chinese in their earlier nuclear submarine building efforts.

While the Chinese have had a hard time building reliable and quiet nuclear subs, they are determined to acquire the needed skills. You do that by doing it and eating your mistakes. U.S. intelligence experts believe that China is now concentrating on the design of the new Type 96s. That may still be the case, and the Type 94 seen at sea may be testing new technology meant for the Type 96. But there are other problems. The Chinese government is apparently uneasy with sending off an SSBN, armed with twelve or more SLBMs, each with one or more nuclear warheads. Western nations carefully select the officers and crews of their SSBNs and use a host of codes and procedures (PAL or "Permissive Action Links") to insure that a single madman cannot use any of those SLBMs. Russia also screened crews and had PAL codes but also had, in effect, representatives of the secret police on the SSBN, whose main job was to insure that the SLBMs were used as the government back in Moscow commanded. China has always been much less trusting of the armed forces when it comes to nuclear weapons. China also appears to lack the advanced PAL technology found in the West. All this doesn't get much mention in the West but it is very real inside China. So when the Type 96 shows up, sometime late in this decade, it will be revealing to see if the Chinese have overcome their reluctance to trust a crew of Chinese sailors with all those nukes.



#### Current International Submarine News

#### Iranian universities constructing eight submarines Azernews.az, April 29, 2013

Isfahan University of Technology in cooperation with three other universities has designed eight military and civil submarines. The construction operations of the submarines are underway, Mehr news agency reported. They have a variety of uses, including tourism, exploration, defense, and laying cables. Iran's Deputy Defense Minister Mohammad Eslami announced earlier this month that the country plans to unveil the first indigenous submarine within the next few months. He added that the final stages of the submarine's design and construction are currently underway and that it will be unveiled by August 2013.

The submarine has been entirely designed and manufactured by Iranian experts, he said. Iran's Navy previously launched the indigenous Tareq 901 and Ghadir class submarines as part of efforts to upgrade the country's defense capabilities, Press TV reported. The Ghadir submarine was first unveiled in 2007. The 120-ton vessel has excellent shallow depth performance and can conduct prolonged coastal missions and launch torpedoes. Eslami also revealed that new indigenous fighters and modern drones would be unveiled in the near future. In recent years, Iran has made great achievements in the defense sector and attained self-sufficiency in essential military equipment and systems.

Iran has repeatedly assured other nations, especially its neighbors, that its military might poses no threat to other countries, insisting that its defense doctrine is based on deterrence.

### Israeli Submarine Named in German Shipyard www.marinelink.com, May 1

'INS Rahav', the Israeli Navy's 5th Dolphin-class submarine, inaugurated at Thyssen-Krupp Marine Systems in Kiel, Germany. The new submarine was unveiled at a special ceremony attended by Commander in Chief of the Israeli Navy Rear Adm. Ram Rothberg, Director-General of the Ministry of Defense Maj. Gen. (Res.) Ehud Shani and a delegation of Israeli and German officials.

The INS Rahav was purchased after an extensive development and acquisition process led by the Ministry of Defense's Procurement and Production Directorate in cooperation with the Israeli Navy. The INS Rahav is scheduled to arrive in Israel in the coming year, upon completion of the installation of all of its operational systems. This class of vessel is considered to be one of the most advanced submarines in the world, and is the most expensive piece of machinery that the Ministry of Defense has procured for the IDF.

The Dolphin-class is a versatile vessel, possessing a wide range of capabilities fit for a large variety of missions. The submarine fleet represents the technological cutting-edge of the Israeli Navy, the IDF and the State of Israel. Sailors in the Israeli Navy's submarine fleet engage in operational activity day after day under a heavy veil of secrecy.

#### French ballistic missile test launch fails Seattle Post Intelligence, May 5

PARIS (AP) — A French ballistic missile test has ended in failure after the missile destroyed itself just minutes after its launch from a nuclear submarine off the coast of Brittany. The French Defense Ministry said in a statement that, as usual, the M51 missile was not armed with a nuclear warhead during the test Sunday. Debris from the missile fell in an area that was closed to sea and air traffic.

The ministry said it was investigating why the test failed. Sunday's was the first failure in the six tests of the M51 so far. The ministry began testing the missile in 2006.
